## ANGLICANS HOLD THANKSGIVINGS

Diocese of Fredericton Now \$25,000 Over Objective With More Coming.

Throughout the Diocese of Fredericton yesterday thanksgiving services were held in the Anglican churches as a result of the success which the Forward Movement Campaign met with.

At Christchurch Cathedral Very Rev. Dean Neales at the morning service announced that up to date \$5,505 had been reported as subscribed by the Forward Movement Committee of the Cathedral. The diocese had raised \$115,000, which was \$25,000 above the objective, and it was thought that when all returns were in the amount would be over one-third above the objective.

In the evening a thanksgiving service was held when His Lordship Bishop Richardson delivered an inspiring sermon. Special psalms and hymns were used. Major Rev. R. J. Hooper intoned the service and the Te Deum was sung at the close.

## At Christchurch Parish Church.

At Christchurch parish church Rev. J. W. Millidge, of St. John, occupied the pulpit at the morning service, choosing as his subject the Temptation of Our Lord in the Wilderness.

At the evening service Rev. A. F. Bate occupied the pulpit, speaking on the spiritual side of the great Forward Movement, and inciting his congregation to carry out that side of the work as well as they had responded to the financial campaign.

## At St. Paul's Presbyterian Church.

At St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Rev. J. S. Sturtevant occupied the pulpit at both the morning and evening service. In the morning the pastor preached the second of a series of sermons on the Book of Judges, the subject being Gideon's Deliverance of Israel.

Miss Edna Baird and D. O. Tees rendered an excellent duet.

At the evening service the subject chosen was A Threshing View of Life. An excellent sermon was given by Miss Mildred Green and D. B. Flewelling.

## At George Street Baptist Church.

Following up the suggestion of the Baptist Forward Movement Committee that the financial drive should lead up to special evangelistic efforts in the various churches, Rev. Z. L. Fash, the pastor of the George Street Baptist Church, on Sunday morning delivered an eloquent sermon on Seeking a Revival. The text which was chosen from Habakkuk forms part of a prayer which has been called Habakkuk's Pindar Ode, majestic in diction and sublime in fact. In this text the prophet was urging the Children of Israel to seek a revival of religion, pure and undiluted.

The sermon was discussed under various heads, firstly: Seeking a Revival by Anticipation. Moses, Nehemiah, John Knox and David Livingstone all prayed for a religious awakening, the pastor stated. The deep religion expressed by the prophet enabled him to do this. Was the present day church looking forward to this revival? The church could not be beaten any more than the British soldiers could, and did not want His church to sound a retreat, out to sound, "Forward, March!" for the salvation of every lost soul. The church should anticipate a revival in its midst.

"God must build His temple," the pastor stated, "for we labor in vain. There are too many Christians with the sign 'let out' as we sometimes see in our cities. As the turbine wheel must be properly placed to receive the impact of the water in use, so must a Christian be under the power of God. George Fox, the great Quaker, said every Quaker should light the country for ten miles around by his own example; so should every Christian. The wonderful scope of the Prophet in relating the vision is seen in the fact that he recognizes the mercy as well as the wrath of God in a general revival.

"The final source of power is in the love of God. That will bring us to God in Heaven if we only let it. I give you the end of a golden string. It will lead you in at Heaven's gate. Built in Jerusalem's wall."

In the evening the pastor preached on the Attractive Power of Christ.

At Brunswick Street Baptist Church, the pastor, Rev. G. C. Warren, occupied the pulpit at both services. In the morning he chose as his subject, The Gentility of Jesus, one of a series of sermons on The Emotions of Jesus. In the evening he spoke on the Descent of the Soul, the first of a series of three sermons on The Prodigal Son.

## At the Salvation Army.

At the Salvation Army Citadel a large gathering were on hand to hear Adjutant Miller's address on: How Jesus Cares. Sister Storey of Moncton rendered an excellent solo, while one of the corps cadets also sang a solo, playing her accompaniment on the guitar.

## LATEST IDEAN LIFE PRESERVER

## Inspector Wilson Talks On the Temperance Situation At the Methodist Church

In Sermon on Sunday Night He Said Temperance People Hope Referendum Will Take Place in Early Summer—Expect to Put an End to Inter-Provincial Shipments "For Private Use" and to Limit Number and Size of Prescriptions.

Rev. W. D. Wilson, provincial prohibition inspector, occupied the pulpit of the Methodist church last evening, speaking on The Present Temperance Situation in New Brunswick and in Canada.

After three years of prohibition the liquor business, he said, had still as much viciousness as ever. It had committed the greatest destruction the world has ever seen and would commit more destruction until it was done away with. In the Great War men had been killed at the rate of 1,500 a day, yet the liquor business in the United States alone had taken a toll of 2,000 men a day. Here the speaker quoted Dr. DeWitt Hillis as saying that millions of children had been born into the world damned, as it were, because of the tendency of the parents for liquor, and would become hovers of wood and drawers of water for this reason. There were men who would sell their very souls for liquor, the speaker stated, and yet he said, statesmen constantly spoke of the benefits accrued from "this accursed business."

Representatives had left Ottawa, on going to the Eastern provinces and one to the West to interview the temperance workers concerning the referendum and to urge upon all the provinces the necessity of having the people present resolutions to their Legislatures asking the Dominion Government to bring on referendum and give the people a chance to vote on the inter-provincial trade business. One province had already done this. In November, 1917, all inter-provincial transportation for other than medicinal and sacramental purposes had been stopped. No sooner had this happened than agents of the liquor people flocked to Ottawa asking for a repeal of the order-in-council, and the results had been seen since the summer of 1919. Now carried after a load of liquor was being spread through the whole Dominion from Montreal and Quebec. Some people in the Dominion were becoming richer, while against this should be contrasted the poverty of some people in other provinces, which was becoming more marked. The transportation of liquor for beverage purposes should be shut off, and at present several provinces were making up for this fact and taking steps to promote such legislation.

## The Provincial Situation.

In the province of New Brunswick the people were confronted with a referendum. One section of the prohibition law stated that after the war was over and after the prohibition law had had a trial, this province should have a referendum. Those responsible for the Act now knew that there were many points in the law that might profitably be changed, but the law did not want to be changed, although it was now becoming old-fashioned. The speaker stated that before the prohibition law was passed duties on the liquor in some places amounted to \$45,000, and since that time they had decreased in fact same places to about \$5,000. Scandals and insinuating remarks had been heard by him while he held his present position, but these he had contracted with the satisfaction that he knew some day the liquor business and its friends would sink into oblivion.

At the recent Dominion conference men from every province had stated that unscrupulous doctors and druggists had ruined prohibition and had left the results of their efforts visible upon the multitude. One woman had stated that her husband had obtained liquor and that it made no difference to her whether he got it from a saloon or from a druggist; he got it, and the result was the same. She had been done in. Prince Edward Island put it into the hands of men who were independent of any other business. The Chief Inspector stated he knew of one doctor who had written 267 prescriptions on Christmas Eve, but when he appeared in court his case was dismissed.

The hope of the temperance people was that the referendum in New Brunswick would come early in the summer and the majority, who would be the Temperance people, would then be able to dictate what would be done with the druggists and doctors. The way to settle the question was to limit the amount of liquor and the number of prescriptions that a druggist or a doctor could give orders for and fill. Some doctors, he stated, were honorable messengers of God,

while others were not. Twenty-five doctors in the province had been convicted and one of them five times, and such situation needed drastic remedies.

The speaker appealed to the congregation "to stand on the right side and by their consistency and prayers help the province of New Brunswick to be worthy of the great Dominion in which it held a prominent place." Canada, he said, held a promising place for the future, and she would be the crowning gem of this Empire of Nations if she could keep her politics and her life pure.
