

THE ROYAL PAIR WEDDED.

PRINCESS VICTORIA TO THE DUKE OF HESSE.

CORONATION, April 10.—The marriage ceremony of Princess Victoria of Edinburgh to the Grand Duke of Hesse which took place in the palace chapel began at 2.30 p.m. In the wedding procession to the chapel the Duke of Saxe-Coburg, the mother of the bride was escorted by Emperor William of Germany and was followed by Emperor Frederick who walked alone. The Prince of Wales and the Duchess of Cornwall came next walking side by side. Queen Victoria was escorted by her son the Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, the father of the bride.

When the bride and groom entered the church a signal was given in which one to which all the bells in the town pealed simultaneously and when the rings were exchanged a salute of 21 guns was fired. The jewels and the bright dresses of the ladies of the Ducal court, and their imperial and royal guests, the gorgeous uniforms of those military garb and the exquisitely beautiful costumes of the bride and her attendants formed a most brilliant picture of splendor. Queen Victoria wore a crown of diamonds.

After the marriage ceremony, the guests went immediately to the great hall where the wedding breakfast was served. Never was such a good natural crowd of people assembled anywhere as passed the streets, and every other foot of space which they were permitted to occupy in the vicinity of the palace. Upon every conceivable pretext they cheered until they were hoarse and when the bride party left the church the cheering was positively deafening.

HALIFAX, April 21.—The whole coast of Nova Scotia, from Chatham right up to the mouth of Halifax harbor, is completely blockaded with ice. Usually when the ice comes out of the gulf of St. Lawrence, it is carried to sea and is soon lost, but for two weeks almost continuously easterly winds have prevailed and all the gulf ice has been blown into the coast and packed up almost solidly. Many of the harbors are entirely shut off from navigation and but few steamers have succeeded in getting into Halifax during the past few days. It is stated that in 1892 there was a similar ice blockade of Halifax brought about by similar conditions. The weather has become much warmer the last two days and this has caused the ice to be melted in the harbor. It is estimated that in the past few days the ice has melted to the west as is hoped the blockade would be over at once.

In the meantime the following steamers are overdue and it is believed are kept outside by the ice: *Cascadia* from Boston, *Adria* from New York, *Sarnia* from Portland, *Dart* from St. John, N. B., *Lalor* from Liverpool, *Halifax* from Boston. Steamers *Portia* for Halifax, *Madara* for St. John, *Barcelona* for Liverpool, *Emancipator* for Philadelphia, *Bridgeport* for Bridgeport and *Lunenburg* for Lunenburg besides a large fleet of sailing vessels are detained in part by the blockade.

REFUSED TO ANSWER.

When the bill authorizing a further issue of \$200,000 debentures in aid of the Woodstock bridge was before the legislature last evening, Messrs. Stockton, Pinner, and Pinner, Chief Commissioner of the Public Accounts, and the returns brought down in answer to the motion of Dr. Stockton as paid on the Woodstock bridge in full of contract or it is there a balance still due Mr. Emmerson, whose duty it was to inform the public of the fact, refused to answer. If the amount mentioned in the public accounts and the returns referred to paid Mr. Kitchen in full, the issue of debentures to complete the superstructure need not be more than \$25,000. Mr. Emmerson has asked for, and got authority, to issue \$200,000. It is the \$13,000 yet due to Mr. Kitchen, or is the \$13,000 to be made more available for election and other purposes through the contractor of the superstructure.
