## FINED HIM \$100.

Young Woman Would Not Lie In Liquor Case.

Harry H. Bain, of Caledonia, was arrested after a long chase on Jackson street last evening by Constables Sayers and Robson. The charges against him were stealing an overcoat and a pair of gauntlets from Fred Moore and stealing two bags of clover seed from the Shira Milling Co., of Caledonia. M. J. O'Reilly, K.C., appeared for the defendant, pleaded not guilty and declined to elect to both charges. The first charge was enlarged till Monday and the second was gone on with and Bain was sent up for trial on it.

Constable Sayers said that Bain admitted the theft after he had been warned. The prisoner said in no defence and was sent up for trial. John Taklerino, Sherman avenue north, had the young lady in court who was said to be able to prove that no liquor was sold to her or her escort. "I cannot tell a lie," said the fair unknown, who refused to tell her name. She said she saw money paid for the booze. The magistrate found Taglerino guilty and fined him \$100. Mr. McClelland made an objection to a second offence fine being imposed for a first offence, but the fine stood.

W. H. Cooper, contractor, was charged under the waterworks by-law with covering a hydrant in such a manner as to interfere with the work of the firemen. The case was dismissed when Cooper agreed to leave the hydrant any way the chief ordered.

Kraker Avedisian and Maridaris Tation were charged with selling liquor without a license in their boarding house at 238 Gibson avenue. These are the men, Constables McKay and Dunoon went after. They claimed they both bought liquor. W. A. Logie, for the defendants, pleaded not guilty, and said that the second of the two men did not even live in the house, although he had a half interest in it, and he was discharged. Avedisian admitted he was the tenant, and said that he would "bet anything you want that I was in Galt while the liquor was being sold." The magistrate did not feel inclined to accept this offer, and said that he was satisfied that liquor was sold, and as to the occupancy, he did not care, so long as Avedisian admitted he was the tenant of the house, or the boss.

A fine of \$50 was imposed.

## NO PATENTS FOR BEACH LOTS.

DECISION THAT WILL CAUSE MUCH ANNOYANCE

There are a lot of disappointed property owners, or rather supposed owners on Burlington Beach. Some time ago, the Beach Commissioners advertised for persons who were entitled to Crown deeds for land on the beach, and who desired to get them to notify the Board. Many persons made application, and their applications were forwarded to the Provincial Crown Lands Department, but only a very small percentage of them have been granted, and most of them have been refused. It appears that before the Government will give a Crown deed the occupant of the land must swear that he has been in possession for 50 years. Of course few are able to do that. Some of those who are unable to get patents have bought land from persons who are, according to the stringent regulation, entitled to a Crown deed. In consequence of the refusal of the Government to issue deeds and rumors that are afloat there is a good deal of uneasiness among cottage and shack owners on the sand strip.

When asked about the matter this morning Commissioner Morlan admitted that the Government had refused to grant Crown deeds except to a few who swore they had been in possession for 50 years. He said he did not anticipate that the Crown Lands Department would make any move to have any of the persons without deeds, dispossessed, but would likely insist that a yearly rental, be paid for the use of the lots.

## WRITS ISSUED.

Local Contractor Wants Money From Typewriter Co.

Lee & Farmer, acting for W. H. Cooper, have issued a writ against the Tilden Jackson Typewriter Co. for \$1,406, the balance due on the masonry of the building. It is understood that Mr. Cooper's claim will be paid.

Crerar, Crerar & Bell have issued a writ against the Bank of Hamilton for Mrs. Agnes Evans for the return of \$5,292 on a note, but she claims that the note had been outlawed, and that the bank had discharged it.

McClelland & Bicknell have issued a writ on behalf of the Kinsman Lumber Co. for \$384 for goods sold and delivered to the Taylor, Scott Company, of Toronto.

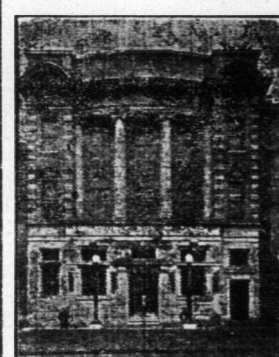
