John Hyde pleaded not guilty to ten charges read by Magistrate Jelfs at the police court this morning. Hyde is accused of unlawfully and knowingly forging documents and absconding with funds belonging to the T., H. & B. He has been in jail since a week ago last Tuesday, and the environment and disgrace of his position have left their marks on his contenence. Dark rings surround his eyes, and his general demeanor was most depressed to-day.

Hyde was employed as the roadmaster clerk and the method which he is alleged to have used to defraud the company was to employ what is known as "dummies," and keep their pay envelopes.

William Smith, Burlington, was found guilty by Magistrate Jelfs on a charge laid by Fishery Inspector Kerr of setting a drag net in the bay on April 15 without a license. Kerr was informed by letter that some one had a net in the pond back of the power house, and the inspector drove down early on the 15th to investigate. Kerr and his son entered an empty boat house to watch. Smith went out from the power house about 7:30 in a boat. He had gone about fifty feet, said Kerr, when he stopped the locat and witness could see him pulling these. feet, said Kerr, when he stopped the boat and witness could see him pulling the net over the side. Smith then pulled for the shore. Wishing to catch him in the act, both the inspector and his son made a dash for the spot where they expected him to land. Smith, however saw them and dropped the net over-

Smith testified that the net the inspector saw in the water that morning was one he had taken away from a couple of boys the day before, and as it was heavy and filled with weeds he had was heavy and filled with weeds he had left it in the water in front of the power house. He wrote a letter in Inspector Kerr telling him the net was there, and asking him to go down and get it. Whether the letter was written before or after he had been caught was a matter that perplexed the court. The post-mark on the letter was April 15, 9 a.m. As the offence was committed at 7.30 that morning Smith would have time to write the note and get it to the postoffice.

In the Magistrate's mind there was little doubt, however, and Smith was fined \$10 and costs.
