Washington, July 30 .- Orville Wright,

The monoplane, burdened with the weight of two passengers, went along closely to the ground, but swoop-ed upwards on a turn to the left, and after some further manoeuvring, went sailing away for a five-mile flight to the south and back, over a course of rough country hills. 
