Synopsis of Canadian Northwest

Land Regulations.

Any person who is the sole head of a tamily, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties: Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely own ed and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, dauger, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing maypre-mpte a quarter section alongside his homestead.

section alongside his homestead.
Pricc \$3 per acre.

'Duties: Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhalsted his homestead right; nd cannot tain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3 per acre. Duties: Must reside six months; in each of three years, cultivate fify acres and erect a house worth \$300.
