

entative of the disease were raised today by the announcement of the dis covery of the cause and the insolu tion of the germ by two doctors of the Rockefeller Institute of Medican Research.

The insolation will permitt experinentation with antidotes and antitoxins. So small is the germ that h must be magnified one thousand times before it is seen distinctly under the microscope. The germ lodges in the nose and throat during the first 36 hours of influenza infect tion, then attacks the lungs in suc a way as to make them susceptible throat, notably those of pneumonia

The report which contains an nouncement of the discoveries regarding the flu germ issues this

"Recent reports received from abroad and from points in the United States," it says, "indicate that a sec ondary wave of epidemic influenza relatively mild in character, is pass ng over parts of Europe and America


