Quebec's Surplus  
Is \$1,300,000

The surplus of the Province of  
Quebec for the year ending 30th  
June amounts to \$1,300,000. This  
is the crux of the financial state-  
ment presented to the Provincial  
Cabinet by the Hon. Jacob Nicol,  
Provincial Treasurer.

In making the statement, the Mi-  
nister pointed out that the result  
had been achieved despite the enor-  
mous sums that have been expend-  
ed by the Government on highways,  
education, colonization and agri-  
culture as well as other depen-  
dencies. He was sure that it would  
be regarded as an excellent tribu-  
te to the system of government in the  
Province of Quebec. That it would  
be so regarded outside of Quebec  
he was quite sure, for he knew of  
no other Province in the Dominion  
or for that matter any other State  
that was capable of making a sim-  
ilar showing.

**Approve Some of  
Soldiers' Policies**  
Of the seventy one soldier's in-  
surance policies brought into ques-  
tion by the amendments made to  
the act last session seven have been  
allowed by the D.S.C.R. for pay-  
ment and eleven others are held up  
for additional information, regarding  
dependents. The remaining fifty  
three applications have been re-  
jected as not coming within the  
provisions of the act. The reasons  
in most cases are either that the  
beneficiaries named are not depend-  
ents, or that the time which elapse-  
d between the application for in-  
surance and the death of the ap-  
plicant did not allow time for its  
approval, which is a statutory bar.  
In one case the application was re-  
ceived after the death of the ap-  
plicant.

**NOW THERE IS  
ARTIFICIAL WOOD**  
Work Of A Norwegian Inventor  
A Norwegian inventor has, after  
many years of experiment, dis-  
covered a method of making arti-  
ficial wood. A mixture consisting  
of sawdust, together with chalk  
and some chemicals is subjected to  
heavy pressure and the result is  
a substance possessing all the qual-  
ities of timber.  
Its specific gravity is the same as  
that of genuine wood, its hardness  
the same as that of oak. It can  
be planed, sawed, bored, nailed  
painted, stained or polished and  
submitted to every process of car-  
pentry or manufacture to which real  
wood is subjected. It will not de-  
teriorate in water and, on account  
of the chemicals it contains is  
impervious to rot. Moreover, it  
only burns at a temperature very  
much higher than that at  
which real wood catches fire.

**CANADA AND THE  
NEW NAVAL BASE  
AT SINGAPORE**  
There are intimations that one of  
the proposals which will be put up  
to Canada at the coming Imperial  
Conference as her share of naval  
defence, will be to furnish the raw  
materials for the construction of the  
great naval base at Singapore which  
is designed to control the sea routes  
on the Pacific.  
Such a proposal the government  
might find some difficulty in re-  
sisting. It would appeal to the  
steel industries of the East and the  
lumber industry of British Colum-  
bia, which would be called on for  
large quantities of material, and a  
powerful lobby in favor of it might  
be expected.  
Premier King has said very plain-  
ly in parliament, however, that any  
action he takes at the conference,  
will be subject entirely to the ratifi-  
cation of parliament. It is scarcely  
conceivable that the Liberal party  
with its record with regard to  
cash contributions to naval defence  
would endorse such a proposal.
