Banker in Danger

TUG SENT TO RESCUE.

At 8 p.m. yesterday, in the height of the storm, the people of Logy Bay heard the cries of men evidently in distress and saw flare up at 200 p.m. rocks thrown from a vessel which was perilously near the rocks. They telephoned for assistance from Mrs. Cross, who lives on Logy Bay Road. Minister Piccott got the news and at 10 o'clock he went forward in the tug Ingraham. The tug rushed to the scene and found the banker Saratoga, of Lunenburg, in a position of extreme danger. She left Trinity yesterday for the Banks, and in the storm which overtook her she was veered but could not clear Red Head in the S. E. gale. The vessel then anchored and dragged "into Logy Bay. When her anchors held she was not 50 yards from the cliff, against which a terrible sea pounded. Had the cables burst not a man would have been saved. The tug stood by until 5 a.m., when the wind ceased and the vessel set sail.

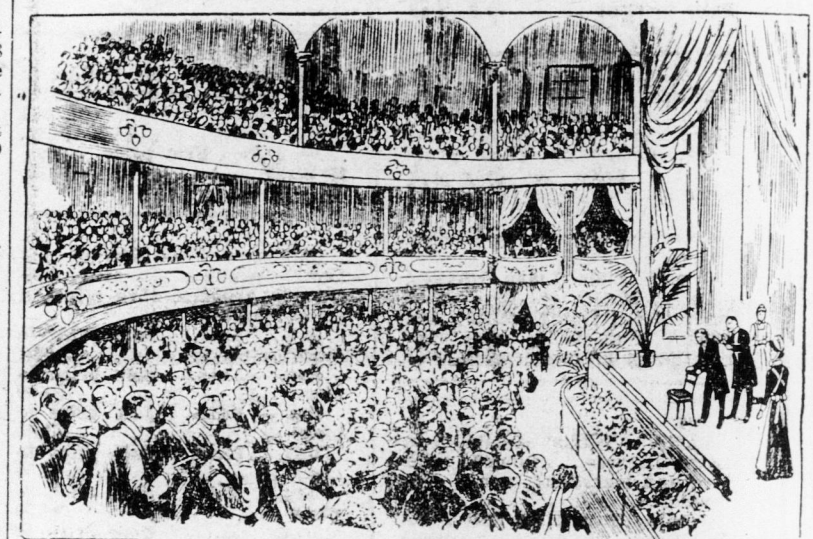
