## An Eye-Opener.

### The Shaky Position of the Morris Team in the West End.

The facts which we laid before the country on Tuesday as to the decline of the Morris influence in the West End division of the St. John's Electoral District was a veritable eye-opener to many who had not paid close attention to the votes cast during the past decade or so.

The outstanding feature of that showing was that Sir Edward Morris himself as leader of the team had come a great cropper.

We showed that in 1904, when he led the Liberal forces for the last time, his majority over his leading opponent was 1221. On the other hand, when he led the Tory forces, as Premier, in 1909, and at a time the tide of feeling in the country was running against the Liberal party, his majority dropped to 247. His vote being actually 69 less than he polled in the fall election. Contrast these figures. His majority dropped from 1221 to 247. In other words, it fell nearly 1,000 under circumstances which were exceptionally favourable to him. He and his supporters can draw but cold comfort from these figures, and much less from the fact that the tide of political feeling is running against the Morris Government in the West End, as well as in the rest of the country. What little stand-by the Morris party have in the West End can be gathered from a contrast between the majorities which the third successful candidate secured over the unsuccessful candidate in 1904 and 1909.

In 1904 Mr. J. P. Scott, Liberal, came out third on the poll and was returned. Mr. J. J. McCarthy, Tory, came out fourth and was not returned. Their votes respectively were:

J. P. Scott ..... 2982  
J. J. McCarthy ..... 1973  
Majority ..... 1009

In 1909 these positions were respectively held by Mr. M. J. Kennedy, Tory, and Mr. W. J. Ellis, Liberal. Their votes were:

M. J. Kennedy ..... 1995  
W. J. Ellis ..... 1858  
Majority ..... 137

What a falling off is shown here! A drop from 1009 to 137. This shows what a small margin Mr. Kennedy had in 1909 as contrasted with Mr. Scott in 1904.

Naturally enough this result has inspired the Liberals in the West End with great hopes, now that there is a strong Liberal tide running there. There is every reason to expect a great change in the political complexion of the West End this fall, and with this feeling and the faith which the people have in Sir Robert Bond and the strong men who will stand for him this fall, the confidence is well placed. In the West End, as in the rest of the Island, the feeling is BOND CAN'T LOSE THIS TIME. It is an unknown result, under manhood suffrage in Newfoundland, for a Tory Party to win a second time.

### Political Pointers.

The adherents of the Picnic Party are in the dumps. They find that all the districts are held by Sir Robert and that the victory will not be a contest. A landslide is coming.

All over the island the change is in the air and when Bond is through there won't be left a "grease spot" of Morris.

St. John's East is a foregone conclusion. Kent and his colleagues CAN'T LOSE! Just watch St. John's West.

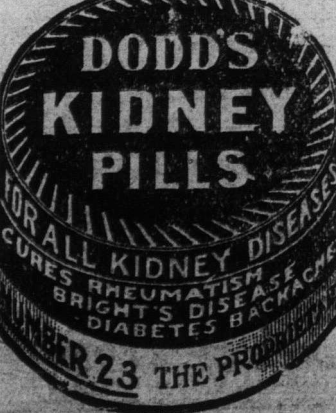
The people there are tired of being coddled and hoaxed for years. They will certainly take their revenge in November, 1913.

### A Dispute.

A dispute, which is at present in abeyance, has arisen between members of the Truckmen's Union and Messrs. Harvey and Company, the Red Cross Line Agents. The Union contend that they are impeded in their way of earning a living, giving as their reason that a large barge is used by Harvey & Co., in bringing fish from the different mercantile premises in town to the Red Cross ships. The President of the Truckmen's Union, Mr. James Barter, yesterday interviewed Messrs. J. M. Harvey and Outebridge who assured Mr. Barter that in the system used for the conveyance of fish it was not intended to be detrimental to the truckmen. The matter will be discussed fully on Monday next, when it is hoped a decision will be reached. It is hoped, to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Mr. John Cove and his little boy, residents of Petty Harbor, were coming off the fishing grounds there yesterday in their skiff with all sails set when they were overtaken by a heavy sea. His little boy, William, tumbled the sheets, a heavy sea ran and they were thrown up on "Mad Rock." It well deserves the name for sea after sea ran over the boat and the father was distracted by the piteous appeals of the boy to be saved. The father to his wail and the lad to his chest in water, still bravely clung to life. When the boat struck on "Mad Rock" the father gave up all hope, but the boy was not so easily overcome. He was just about sunset but the weather was terrible. The boat was fast going to pieces when Messrs. Eyles and Miller came to the rescue. Had the men been a few moments later, father and son would have been drowned in sight of their own homes. The Telegram reporter to-day Mr. Cove said it was the narrowest escape of his life.
