#### TEACHERS SALARIES.

Mr. Samson, in the Nfld. Teachers Journal, has an illuminating article in the powers of the C. H. E., by which we find that the powers of this body are very limited indeed. Mr Samson supports Hon. J. A. Robin son's proposal to extend these powers, and points out what might be accom plished by so doing. He also draws attention to the mistaken policy of not providing better facilities and etter pay to ensure a capable and satisfied supply of teachers. I have been reading of some statistics of On tario's progress for the 10-year period 1904-14. The amount paid in salaries to the teachers in the public or elementary schools has more than doubled. The salaries of the male teachers in the rural elementary schools rose from \$385 in 1904 to \$614 in 1914, and those of the femal teachers from \$294 to \$543. In the elementary schools in the towns the male salaries increased from \$756 to \$1,276, and the female salaries from It is beyond question that a child \$406 to \$686. This increase resulted in a considerable improvement in th qualifications of the teachers.

It would be interesting to compa are satisfied if we can get men and women to teach our schools. Their fitness and capability do not appar ently mean much to us.
