

Magisterial Inquiry.

INTO MOTOR TRAGEDY.

The further inquiry into the Goulds notor car tragedy was held yesterlay afternoon in the Magistrate's Court before Judge Morris. Private John Parker, who is charged with nanslaughter, was present with his counsel, Mr. W. J. Higgins. Mr. J. A. W. McNeily, on behalf of the Crown, and Supt. Grmes and Detective Byrne, representing the police, were also present. One witness, Aden Hogan, a discharged invalid soldier of the Waterford Hall Convalescent Home, who was in company with the accused when the fragedy occurred, was examined by Mr. McNeily. The inquiry will be continued on Monday afternoon next when Private Charles Curran, who was also in the car at he time of the tragedy, will give
