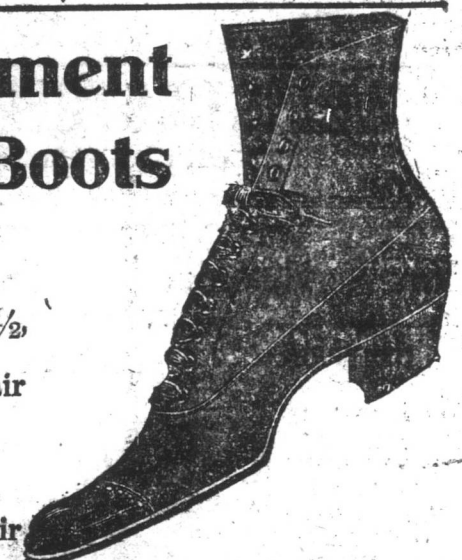

## Curious Clocks.

The first pendulum clock ever made in England was constructed by a Dutchman named Fromantel, in 1622. It was not, however, until about 1676 that repeating clocks and watches came into use generally; before this date they were rare and valuable possessions, consequently being more artistically and elaborately made.

There are many historic and valuable old clocks which are Crown property, and an inventory of all the Royal clocks is kept at Windsor Castle. It contains a list of 230 clocks most of them of great interest.

For instance, there is the clock given by King Henry VIII. to Anne Boleyn on her wedding-day. It is only four inches deep and but ten inches high—a real pigmy clock; It later came into the possession of Horace Walpole, but when he died it was bought back for the Crown by Queen Victoria, for £110-5s. The weights are beautifully engraved, and have the initials "H. & A." for "Henry" and "Anne," and a true lovers' knot besides.

There are also still some specimens of the old "Act of Parliament" clocks existing. There were so called because Pitt, when Prime Minister, placed a tax on watches, and consequently taverns and other places where people gathered had large clocks made, for the benefit of people who could not afford watches.

## Tell-Tale Eyes.

At Buckingham Palace there is a wonderful clock made by Lapine, who established a watch factory at Geneva under the direction of Voltaire himself. This clock takes the form of a negro's head, and the hour numerals are shown in one of her eyes, whilst in the other are the minute divisions. The clock measures 2 ft.

5½-in. in height, and is magnificently ornamented.

Another fine old clock at Buckingham Palace was made for George III. by Alexander Cumming, of Edinburgh. The lucky maker of this time-piece received £2,000 for his work, and a further £200 a year for looking after it.

Two larger clocks which are famous are the Abbey clock at Glastonbury, which ran for 500 years, making a record; and the complicated but beautiful great clock at Strasburg, which tells the season, the month, the day, and the hour, besides having a wonderful chime. Hampton Court has also a wonderful clock.

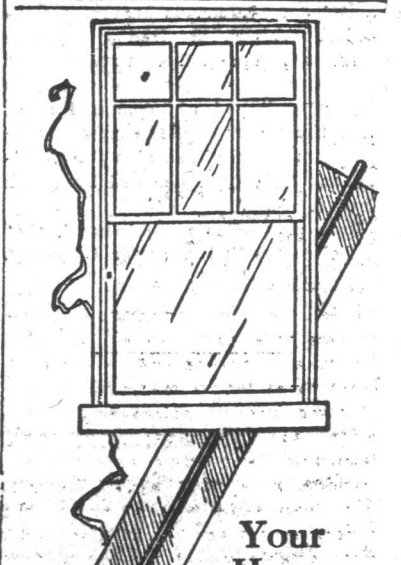
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The three largest clocks in this country to-day are Big Ben at Westminster, the great clock in the Crystal Palace, and the clock on the Royal River Building at Liverpool, which is even larger than London's Big Ben.

A treaty of alliance between Great Britain and Iraq was signed at Baghdad on October 10 by the British Commissioner, Sir Henry Cox, and the Iraq Premier, Sir Salyid Abdurrahman. Under the treaty, which consists of 18 clauses, King Feisal agrees to be guided by the advice of King George on international and financial obligations and interests for the whole period of the treaty, which will remain in force for 20 years, such support and assistance to the armed forces of the King of Iraq as may be necessary to be provided by Great Britain. No gazetted official of other than Iraq nationality shall be appointed in Iraq without the concurrence of the British King. The organic

law which King Feisal agrees to frame for presentation to the Constituent Assembly of Iraq shall ensure to all complete freedom of conscience and free exercise of all forms of worship, religion and language.
