WITH THE BOXERS.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—A cablegram was received last night by Tex Rickard from Georges Carpentier, French lightweight champion, saying he was ready to come here now. Carpentier said he would meet either Mike McTigue, world's champion in Carpentier's division; Gene Tunney, holder of the United States; Harry Greb, from whom Tunney regained it, or Battling Siki, who wrestled the world crown from Carpentier and lost it to McTigue.

ROME, Dec. 3.—Erminio Spalla, the Italian heavyweight pugilist, defeated Mariano Barbarelli, another Italian heavyweight, in the fifth round of their bout Saturday night. The fighting was all in Spalla's favor, and Barbarelli refused to continue after the fifth. At that time he mentioned to Spalla that he had had enough and said he did not want his body marked.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 3.—Benny Leonard, lightweight champion, has accepted an offer by Tex Rickard, of \$200,000 to box Mickey Walker, welterweight champion, a 15-round decision bout in New York next July.

PARIS, Dec. 2.—Quintin Romero Rojas, the Chilean heavyweight pugilist, knocked out Marcel Nilles, former heavyweight champion of France, Saturday night in the third round. The fight, which took place in the Velodrome d'Hiver, was a have been a twenty-round affair.

Rojas used his right with good effect, and the former French heavyweight champion was knocked cold thirty seconds after the gong sounded for the third round. The Frenchman was the cleverer boxer, and had the better of the encounter up to the last minute of the second round, but the first solid blow landed by Rojas, a right, reaching the pit of the Frenchman's stomach, practically put an end to the fight. Nilles being saved by the gong.

He came up groggy for the third round, and Rojas merely tapped the same spot with a short left. The Frenchman collapsed, completely out.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—Tex Rickard yesterday declined to reveal details of negotiations he has had under way for some time to match Harry Williams, negro heavyweight, and Luis Firpo, but indicated that some progress toward arranging the bout had been made.

Rickard admitted receiving word from Firpo in which the latter suggested May 5 as a satisfactory date for holding the fight. The promoter, however, said he had no definite date in mind although he said some time about May 1 would be desirable.

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—Seven boxing matches headed by Jack Hausner, of

New York and Ernie Gooseman were stopped by the police on orders of Mayor William E. Dwyer, after Arthur Burrago Parawell, of the Chicago Law and Order League, had made complaint. This was the first attempt to resume boxing in Chicago since the boxing match between Benny Leonard and Pinky Mitchell several months ago, which broke up in a free-for-all fight. To-night's matches had been advertised for, "a suburban club," those "in the know" being able to find the scene of the fight. The police, however, apparently had no trouble in locating the place.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Dec. 3.—Harry Greb has been matched to meet Johnny Wilson, of Boston, in Madison Square Garden, January 18. Red Mason, Greb's manager, announced today, Greb's share will be about \$30,000.

EAST CHICAGO, Ind., Dec. 3.—Sammy Mandell, featherweight title aspirant, will meet Eddie Brady, of Brooklyn, in the feature bout of a boxing show here, to-night. Josie Kaufmann and Kewpie Tremble will do the preliminary bout.

SCHOONER BLUENOSE OFFERED FOR SALE; TENDERS CALLED FOR.

HALIFAX, N.S., Dec. 4.—Tenders for the sale of the schooner Bluenose, fleetest of fishermen, will be called for following a decision reached at a meeting of the shareholders of the vessel held at Lunenburg over the week-end. Capt. Angus Walters in his capacity of managing owner was also instructed to keep the shareholders advised regarding any legal action he contemplated looking to the return of the International trophy, not awarded this year owing to the failure of Walters and his crew to abide by the decisions of the sailing committee. The decision to sell the Bluenose has grown out, it is believed, of the wrangling over rules at Halifax this year.

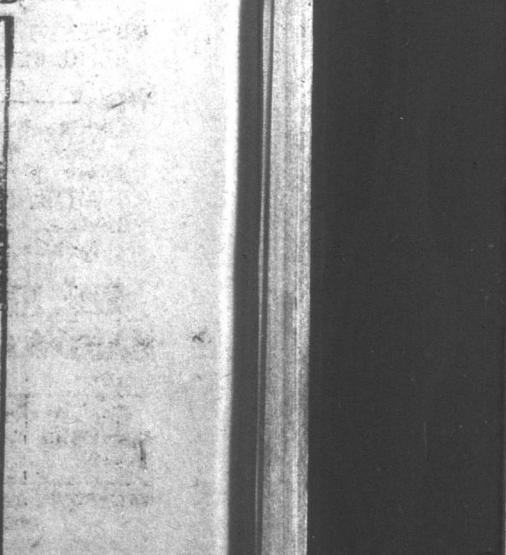
When the runner started on their dash, Ellis fell and fractured a bone in his right leg. He finished the race and then collapsed on the field.
