TRLEGRAPHIC.—The English Post Office have completed their arrangements, under the Tolegraph Act, with the whole of the telegraph companies for the purchase of their undertakings, and have nearly settled their arrengements with the railways. The amount of purchase money required is now therefore so nearly ascertained that a reliable estimate may be arrived at of the probable financial result to the country. The money will be raised at from 3½ to 3½ per cent., and the revenue derived from the telegraph business shows a return of between 5 and 6 per cent. upon the total sum required, and therefore a large net gain to the national revenue. The basis of 20 years purchase of the net receipts of the companies, as fixed by Parliament under the Act, includes the plant as well-as the goodwill of the business. The Act of 1843 prescribed twenty-five years' purchase of the net profits and of the prospective profits of the railways, so that present arrangement is far more favorable to the country than-existing precedents would have appeared to warrant.
