THE MANAGER'S REPORT. The following report was presented to

the advisory board:

Ladies and Gentlemen,-It is with gratitude to God, and a deep sense of our re-sponsibility in the work for newsboys, that this report is respectfully submitted to your thoughtful consideration. It is sufficient to say with regard to its history that the Newsboys' Hall was organized on the 26th day of last December as a mission Sunday school and a place where the boys of the street could be sheltered and fed, and could be mentally, morally and physically employed and kept from vagrancy, and thus eventually drift into crime and violence as a means of getting a livelihood. It is the purpose of the founder of the hall to take vagrant boys, street waifs, bad boys, tough boys, and so handle them as to make them almost completely self-supporting, while teaching them lessons of economy, sobriety, honesty and Scott also testified to the great benefit she herself had derived from the use of at the same time. It is an easy matter that they would not be without them in to inculcate what has been aptly termed "the work habit" into boys who have been decently educated and well trained at home, but imagine what must be the task to give this habit to a boy who is absolutely illiterate, and knows not what it is to have a decent, comfortable home; who hates work and would rather beg or steal; whose refectory has been garbage, buckets at the rear doors of hotels and restaurants. Place such a boy into an average charitable institution, where he gets food, decent clothing and a warm bed, for which he is not compelled to render any service in return, and what is the result? Does he become fitted to go out into the world and become a respectable, self supporting citizen? No. He "knows a soft snap when he gets it." He becomes a pauper. Although the founder met with hostile sneers and the personal malice of a few enemies, he went right on as God led him, and feels greatly blessed by what has already been accomplished. We have 80 boys on the list whose time is employed, attending prayers, singing, Gospel talks, military drills, mes-

senger service and manual labor. We have inaugurated a perfect messenger service, and it is our purpose to add a kindling wood department, clothes cleaning and pressing department, etc. The object sought is to keep the boys so busy that they will have no time for mischief. A newsboys' hall savings bank was instituted on the 1st inst., it being the intentien to teach these boys something that will render them independent and ground them in habits of thrift. The Sunday school has had an average attendance of 28 boys. Since January 21 287 meals have been given, 103 of which have been free or charity meals.

Two boys from other cities have been

taken in, clothed and fed and sheltered, and have proven themselves worthy of the hospitality of the hall. One boy has been sent to the hospital. Five boys are nightly sheltered. Boys are assisted from time to time with clothes and provisions which have been donated by kind friends. Ten per cent of the food consumed has been donated. God has wonderfully supplied their wants in the way of shoes and clothes. Discipline is maintained by a court of inquiry, which passes sentence and watches over the conduct of the boys, and a correct record is kept of their daily deportment. Their habits are so scrutinized by our "secret service" department that we know just what is going on in our absence. In cases of truancy we immediately communicate with the child's parents and also report cases to the truant officer. Minor cases and petty offenses which can be settled between the boys themselves by apology do not come before the court. As a rule the boys are very forgiving and charitable. The run-ning of the hall thus far has been conducted on a total receipt of \$140 90, \$79 96 of which has been advanced by Mr. S. Grigg out of his own personal funds. The balance represents donations from outsiders

and receipts from kitchen, etc. If the practical results of only five weeks uphold me and appeal to your Christian sympathy, then in the name of blighted, unhappy and crime-claimed childhood, in the name of our dear city, in the name of law and order, in the name of your own dear ones and of the Savior who commanded that both your happy children and the outcast children of the streets should be suffered to come unto him alike, I beg you to give this, the Lord's work, your hearty support, and he will add his blessing.

A Record of Good Work Done by the The Deposed Queen of Hawaii Will

Be Banished And Royalist Conspirators Put to Death -Foreigners Will Claim Brit-

ish Protection. WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—It is learned that the Hawaiian Government is seriously considering the advisability of putting to death the Royalists who were prominent in the recent revolution against the Republic. It is already known that Queen Liliuokalani will be banished, and that it is not impossible that she will arrive in the United States

on an early steamer. Congress has been persistent in demanding from the Administration the fact regarding the participation of English subjects in the revolution, and has at last passed the Pitt resolutions asking for the names of British conspirators. The fact that the representative of England at Honolulu had demanded immunity for these Englishmen who had been guilty of treasonable practices has whetted the appetites of patriotic Congressmen for all the facts in the posses-

sion of the State Department. There are under arrest in Honolulu 164 persons, including half-breeds and natives. Of these 30 were taken in the field engaged in actual hostilities against the Government; 75 were arrested on the charge of conspiring against the Government, and the remainder are suspects held for investigation. A majority of the foreigners under arrest claim the protection of the British flag.
