GIRL KILLS BEAR:

Who Would Not Desert the Man She Loved.

One of the most courageous acts ever performed by a young girl on the western border will have to be credited to Miss Irene Karnoc, of Burnet county, Texas, who the other day saved the life of Fritz Struve by driving the sharp prongs of a fisherman's spear into the heart of a big bear while the ferocious animai had the young man on his back in the waters of the Color-

ado River.
Mr. Struve and his sweetheart were fishing for trout near Falling Waters. never dreaming of an encounter with a wild beast, though bear and jaguars are both often seen in that locality. It is a mountainous region, and at that particular place a great bluff rises almost from the brink of the river to a height of several hundred feet. There is barely room for one to walk or find a place where two persons meeting each other can pass in safety. It is one of the finest localities for capturing game fish with a book and the with a hook and line in Western Texas. Though the trail is narrow and the place is lonely and awe-inspiring, the certainty of being amply rewarded for the venture causes many people to ig-

nore all risks and forget features that are neither soothing to the nerves or pleasing to the eye. Fritz and Miss Karnoc had found a nice cool retreat under the bluff, and they were enjoying fine sport, when they heard the yelp of a dog, followed by the noise of rocks falling and splashing into the water, Mr. Struve instantly realized that some animal was coming around the bluff, doubtless following the narrow ledge upon which he was seated.

Fortunately, or perhaps unfortunately, he occupied a position between the young lady and the rapidly approaching terror. Fully realizing the danger of the situation, for visions of a howling jaguar followed by a pack of hounds, flashed across his mind, he sprang to his feet and shouted to Miss Irene to run away. The words were hardly out of his mouth before the monster black bear ran against him, and both man and animal rolled into the river. It was an unequal contest, for it required all the young man's strength to keep afloat, and the thoroughly enraged bear would soon have torn him to fragments if his courageous little sweetheart had not come to his rescue. Again the young girl drove the sharp spear into the maddened bear's side. After making several desperate efforts to reach his enemy, the bear seized the spear between his jaws and tore it from his side. It will lie on its back, will have a polished metal case just like the ordinary watch, and will be so large and roomy inside that people will be able to walk around in it, among the moving wheels. It will be nearly 75 feet in diameter, and more than 40 feet high,

with neat little stainways running all about it, and all the wheels properly protected so that no one can be hurt nor have his clothes soiled. GREAT DAMAGE DONE AIT TIEN and what is called the "hairspring" in a watch will be as thick as a man's wrist. It will take about two minutes for the balance wheel to swing around and back again. It will be pivoted on two enormous agate blocks—substitutes for diamonds—and will be made of

brass. One of the greatest difficulties will be in getting a balance spring of the size and strength that can stand the strain and keep its elasticity. The mainspring, of course, will be an enormous affair, something over 300 feet for. in length and made of ten spring steel bands two inches thick, bound together, as it would be impossible to roll so


