FIFTEEN KILLED!

Catastrophe Caused by Collapse of a Church Steeple at Klissura, Albania.

London, May 1.—A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Constantinople asserts that fifteen persons were killed by the collapse of the cupola of the Greek Church at Klissura, Albania, and that the catastrophe is said to have been the work of Bulgarian agitators.

CANADIAN GALLANTRY!

Fully Recognized in Gen. Colville's Report of Paardeberg Operations.

Two Obstacles Said to Stand in the Way of Peace Negotiations—Boers Burn a Loyal Farmer's Fine Homestead.

London, May 1.—General Sir Henry Colville's dispatch on the operations at Paardeberg, which were mislaid in the war office, and which Mr. Brodrick, the war secretary, declared was never received, was published last evening. It contains nothing damaging or that could have induced the government to wish to hide it. There is little in it not already known. General Colville praises most highly the gallantry of the Canadians, who were engaged in the operations.

At the reception being the prime minister of Queensland, on his visit to Durban, representatives of the Canadian Government spoke. They said they were investigating matters connected with the trade between Canada and Natal, and were seeking means to improve the commercial relations between the two countries. They claimed that Canadians could supply as good products as the United States, and that Canadians were more honest in their dealings.

OBSTACLES IN THE WAY OF PEACE.

London, April 30.—The Daily News says there is reason to believe that General Kitchener has kept alive the peace negotiation with Commandant General Botha, and that they will possibly take a more active form, but that two obstacles to an understanding—Sir Alfred Milner and the treatment of the Cape rebels—have not been removed.

BURNED BY BOERS.

Cape Town, April 30.—The Boer invaders, under Commandant Scheepers, burned down a fine homestead in the Somerset East district because the owner refused to swear that he would observe neutrality. Commandant Scheepers formerly lived on the adjoining farm.

The transport Manila has sailed for Bombay with 1,000 Boer prisoners.

BIERS ACTIVE IN CAPE COLONY.

Cape Town, April 30.—Sir Gordon Sprigg, premier of Cape Colony, reports that eleven members of the Western Province Rifles were attacked by 90 Boers near Brandvlei, 2 were killed, 3 wounded, and the remainder were captured.

The Boers in the neighborhood of the Kenhardt district of Cape Colony are actively engaged in removing supplies to various laagers.

Commandant Malan, after a skirmish with Col Henniker's Volunteers, in which the burghers are said to have suffered somewhat, retreated with the purpose of joining Scheepers' command in West Cradock. They were driven back, however, by the Cape Mounted Riflemen into Waterkloof. The British casualties were one killed and one wounded.

Commandant Kritzinger's commando is being very closely followed by the British. The main body, estimated to number 500, was engaged by Col. Crew's column near Gelfenfontein, and is being driven towards the Orange River.

Reported raiding and looting parties are reported to be in the Richmond, Muraysburg, and Middelburg, Cape Colony districts.

The Boer prisoners now number 17,933.

SITUATION IN THE FAR EAST

Almost as Unsatisfactory as Ever.

Quite Is Not Restored in China—Petty Attacks on Foreigners Continue—Bodies of Well-Armed Chinese Secretly Drilling.

London, May 1.—"It is reported that the Japanese Government has reserved a subsidized mail steamer for its own use," says the Shanghai correspondent of the Morning Post. "This suggests that Japan is preparing for emergencies. The desperate state of the private finances of Japan is said to be making the war propaganda peculiar."

"According to opinion in Shanghai, an outbreak of hostilities would be a signal for a rising throughout China."

UNREST EVERYWHERE.

"Everywhere among the Chinese there is a feeling of unrest," says a dispatch to the Standard from Tien Tsin.

QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY.
The Minister of Justice Made an LL. D.

Degrees Conferred at Today's Convocation Upon Graduates and Others.

Kingston, May 1.—This afternoon, the annual commencement exercises of Queen's University were held. They were a great success. There were 62 graduates in all, divided thus: Bachelors of divinity, 5; testaments in theology, 2; bachelors of science, 2; masters of art, 11, 2 being ladies; bachelors of arts, 42, of whom 13 were ladies. The medallists in moderns, English and history were ladies.

Among the degrees conferred was that of LL.D., bestowed on Hon. David Mills, Minister of Justice. There were many regrets that the state of public business at Ottawa prevented this distinguished statesman from being present to receive the honor in person, but Principal Grant has a strong conviction that Dr. Mills will be prevailed upon to attend at one of the autumn convocations, and deliver the introductory lecture. There was great applause when the name of Hon. Mr. Mills was presented for the degree by the senate of the university, who unanimously chose him as a fitting native Canadian upon whom to confer the high honor.

Three new cases of smallpox have developed in Carden township.

Saltfleet township has dismissed its clerk and treasurer, and appointed Major F. M. Carpenter to the dual office.

The Grand Orange Lodge may meet at Brockville instead of Winnipeg, owing to trouble concerning railway rates.

Victoria University will acquire land north of the college grounds as a campus and site for a woman's residence.

A commission to revise the statutes of Manitoba has been appointed, consisting of Chief Justice Killam, Messrs. E. L. Taylor and L. H. McMeans.

General Sir Archibald Hunter has been appointed to the command of the forces in Scotland, and General Ian Hamilton has been appointed military secretary to the war office.

The C. P. R. will pay the family of George Lundquist, of Smith's Falls, an engineer who died as the result of an accident to the Montreal express, on March 15, at St. Polycarpe, the sum of \$3,000.

General O'Grady-Haley would like to see the employers of labor in the large cities of Canada give their employees who belong to the militia half a day off on Wednesday of each week during the summer months for training.

Canadian Pacific shares established a high water mark on the Montreal Stock Exchange Tuesday, selling up to 100 1/2. At 101 1/2 Canadian common stock is valued at \$65,000,000, which is a rise of \$50,000,000 within a comparatively short time.

Mayor Morris, of Ottawa, threatens the aldermen who have voted an illegal payment that steps will be taken to unseat them. The city borrowed \$450,000 on a note, and of this sum about \$170,000 has been expended, while the balance of \$280,000 is due on a last year's note. The mayor holds that the arrears on last year's note should be paid out of this year's note, and that the aldermen say the city need not spend on last year's note any of the money borrowed this year, and that what is due on last year's note should be paid as the arrears of taxes.

THE FLURRY IN WALL STREET.
New York, May 1.—The stock market showed a rather feverish tone at the opening, the striking gains of May stocks being offset by sharp losses in a few important stocks.

LAD BREAK IN WELLAND CANAL.
Port Daulhousie, Ont., May 1.—There is a bad break in the Welland Canal. The steamer D. R. Van Allen, in coming down last night, struck the flood gates, being offset by sharp losses in a few important stocks.

At 2 in the afternoon there will be a salute of 45 guns, following this there will be one shot for each state in the Union.

At 3 o'clock 5,000 pigeons which have been brought from cities east of the Mississippi River and north of Georgia will be liberated. They will carry messages to the governors of various states announcing the opening.

At dusk the electrical features of the exposition will be displayed.
