Transmural Ventilation.

[London Telegraph.] In the year 1873 Dr. Flügge proved that air will go through the walls of a closed room, at a rate depending mainly on the difference of temperature between the inside and the outside—the latter being the lower. With walls of ordinary thickness he found that about one-fourteenth of the air in the room would be changed per degree centigrade per hour. In other words, if the outer were 14 degrees centigrade colder than the inner, the air of the room would be completely changed in an hour by transpiration through the walls. M. H. Wolpert has re-examined this subject, and he finds that in a chamber with 60 cubic yards capacity, having walls of masonry covered with paper, the air will be

changed at the rate of one-fortieth of its volume per degree centigrade per hour. When the paper on the walls contained oil varnish decidedly less air permeated, while without paper at all much more went through. It is desirable, therefore, that the exterior of houses should be clean, and that a heavy rain is a blessing in this respect. Also it follows that the greater the difference between inside and outside warmth, the more copious this spontaneous ventilation. Pettekofsky found that when materials like slag and glass were used, through which air could not pass, the cement employed were, as a rule, highly permeable.

BURNED IN THEIR HOME

Sad Fate of a Family in Buffalo.

Four Persons Badly Injured by Fire at the American Soc.

Five Men Killed in a Railway Collision—Mme. Nordica Among the Injured—Other Mishaps.

Buffalo, N. Y., Jan. 13.—Henry Pearlstein, his wife and five children, ranging in age from 1½ to 12 years, were burned to death yesterday morning in a fire that destroyed a two-story frame building at 1447 Broadway. Joseph Supowski, who owned the building, and Karl Bracki, Supowski's brother-in-law, have been arrested. Supowski carried an insurance of \$8,000 on the building and its contents, which the police say is a very liberal valuation.

The Pearlsteins and another family lived in rooms above the shoe store. They were asleep when the fire started. Supowski told the police today that he accidentally dropped a lamp. A few minutes after the fire began, there was a terrific explosion that blew out the front of the store. Plate glass windows on the opposite side of Broadway were shattered and the sound of the explosion was heard two blocks away. The family living in the rear flat barely escaped with their lives.

The Pearlsteins were awakened, but before they could reach the fire started, they were leading from their rooms the fire had undermined the floor in the hallway, and it collapsed under their feet, carrying them down into a seething mass of flames. Their charred bodies were found four hours after the firemen had extinguished the flames. The body of the mother and baby were found together, the little one tightly clasped in its mother's arms. Pearlstein's body was found close to that of his wife. He also held one of the children in his arms. The bodies of the other three children were found huddled together, close to the father's body.

FOUR BURNED.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Jan. 13.—The home and contents of the Planets were destroyed by fire Saturday morning, and the eleven inmates barely escaped with their lives. Four members of the family were horribly burned in making their escape from the house, their passage being through a mass of flames. A 10-year-old boy saved his life by jumping from a second-story window. The little one tightly clasped in its mother's arms. Pearlstein's body was found close to that of his wife. He also held one of the children in his arms. The bodies of the other three children were found huddled together, close to the father's body.

FELL ON THE LAMP.

Montreal, Jan. 13.—Amy McPherson, 20 years old, daughter of Daniel McPherson, Lonsington street, got up Saturday morning at 3 o'clock on account of feeling sick. She went to the lamp became so faint that she fell on the lamp. Her clothes became ignited, and she was so badly burned that she died four hours afterwards.

FELL FROM THE BUMPERS.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Jan. 13.—Charlie Thomas (colored), aged 20 years, fell from the bumpers of a stock train as it was pulling into the Michigan Central yard early Saturday morning, and the wheels passed over his left leg, badly crushing it. He was taken to the hospital, where a surgeon amputated the limb near the hip. The shock was too much for the unfortunate young man, and his life slowly ebbed away until death relieved his sufferings about 1 p.m. He became conscious just before death, and gave his name as above, claiming to have ridden on a freight train from Springfield, Ohio, to Windsor, Ont. Thomas said he rode on the bumpers of a stock train from Windsor, had fallen asleep and was knocked off upon the track, being stopped entering Montreal.

FIVE MEN KILLED.

Rome, Ga., Jan. 13.—As a result of a collision between a passenger train and a freight train on the Southern Railway early yesterday morning, near Reeves Station, 20 miles north of Rome, five men were killed. The locomotive of the freight train plowed its way half the length of this car. The cook (Robert Hatch) was caught in the wreck, and was seriously injured. 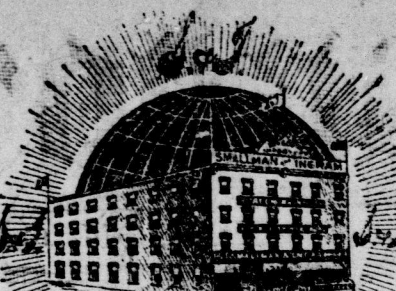

ANOTHER BANK HAS CLOSED

In Connection With the Everett-Moore Embarrassment.

Syndicate Has Secured Loans in Banks at Various Points from Maine to California.

PEOPLE'S BANK OF PAINESVILLE CLOSED.

Painesville, Ohio, Jan. 13.—The People's Bank of this city, closed its doors Saturday on account of the suspension of the Bank of Cleveland, and Savings Company, of Cleveland. Dr. H. C. Brainerd is vice-president, and C. H. Stewart, a director of the local bank. A big run was expected on the bank, which it was thought it would be impossible to meet. No statement of assets and liabilities has yet been made. A statement issued by the bank Oct. 1 last, showed its total resources to be \$250,000; capital stock paid in, \$50,000; individual deposits, \$173,400; undivided profits, \$7,000. G. G. Grant, one of the directors of the bank, made the following statement:

"There is no reason why the bank should not pay every dollar. This bank was run independent of the Cleveland bank, and its securities are independent. It is impossible to realize quickly on securities on account of close connections, but we have less than \$500 with the Cleveland bank."

EASTERN CREDITORS LENIENT.

Cleveland, Ohio, Jan. 13.—The bankers' committee in charge of the Everett-Moore syndicate today received a telegram from Henry A. Everett in New York, stating that the eastern creditors would co-operate with the committee in granting extensions.

F. H. Goff, of the law firm of Kline, Carr, Tolles & Goff, has been made a member of the committee, to represent the unsecured creditors of the syndicate.

WHAT THE COMMITTEE EXPECTS

It is the expectation of the bankers' committee to make arrangements for the complete financing of the entire system. The statement was made today that all but two of the roads composing the system are already well financed.

According to Chairman Newcomb, arrangements will be made to pay the employees of the Sandusky division by the last of next week. Arrangements were made today to meet the pay roll of the Federal Telephone Company at the same time. The members of the committee unite in the statement that the object of their work is solely connected with the affairs of the Everett-Moore syndicate. They are not considering the affairs of any outside bank.

Cleveland, Ohio, Jan. 13.—(Special Detroit Free Press)—The bankers' committee having in charge the affairs of the Everett-Moore syndicate, spent much time Saturday discussing matters pertaining to the placing of the Lake Shore Electric Railway Company in the hands of a receiver. The committee feels that the appointment of a receiver is the wisest course, in view of the fact that \$400,000 of the bonds of the Lake Shore Electric Railway Company, which has assigned, the step was taken to prevent the possibility of receivers being appointed in any of the different counties in which the road runs.

STRIKE CALLED OFF.

Washington, Jan. 13.—The proposition to vote Mrs. McKinley a pension of \$5,000 a year for life may fail. Motives of delicacy restrain members of congress from talking much about it, but they believe it is undesirable to pension presidents' widows, particularly when, like Mrs. McKinley, they have already a competence.

BATHED BUST IN WHISKY.

Chicago, Jan. 13.—Convinced of the error of his ways by the words of the Rev. Ray Palmer, who was pleading in the Woman's Temple with his audience to forsake liquor, P. S. Froesch, teacher of music, rose to his feet with a shout. Taking a bottle of whisky from his pocket, he hurled it to the platform. It struck the bust of Miss Frances Willard, which stood near the speaker's desk, and broke with a loud report.

FISHERMEN LOSE HEAVILY.

St. Johns, Nfld., Jan. 13.—Owing to the extremely mild weather, the frozen herby fishery in Placentia Bay, pursued by a large fleet of American vessels from Gloucester, is practically a failure. It is impossible for vessels to procure a cargo, and there is no frost to freeze the fish. Heavy losses are certain to befall the American fleet and Newfoundland interests concerned.
