A Neglected Study.

"Will the coming struggle mean a wider, more vital interest among all our boys and girls just entering manenthusiasm for information concerning the origin of public wealth, the secrets of state revenues, and the laws which govern our fiscal system? There is no subject touching men on the practical side which is so much neglected as political enonomy. The difficulty is that most of the text books are too dull and neavy, and yet the subject is one that can be made clear and attractive for persons of ordinary education. The lack of the most elementary instruction in the science of economics is responsible for a great deal of loose thinking on fiscal questions.

The Debt of the Country.

The Dominion Treasury receipts for the fiscal year 1903, ending June 30 last, amounted to \$63,739,271, but a number of accounts are outstanding which may bring the total revenue up to \$65,000 as compared with \$58,000,000 last year, and \$13,000,000 in the first year after Confederation. The surplus for the year 1903 will be about \$15,000,000. Capital and special expenditures will absorb eight or nine millions, leaving at least \$5,000,000 for the reduction of the public debt. The operation of the sinking fund will take another two millions and a half from the debt, which stood at \$271,829,089 last year. The Dominion started at confederation with a net debt of \$75,-



The Story of His Rise to the Popacy and His Brilliant Achievements.

Cardinal Camerlingo, together with a the diocese of Anagni, in the Papal States, on March 2, 1810, being christened under the name of Joachim Vincent Pecci. The Society of Jesus, which tired in the pontifical vestments, as a it was afterwards the first care of his pontificate to restore to its ancient position in the councils of the church, was intrusted with his education, young Pecci being sent at the age of eight years to the Jesuit college at Viberbo, where he remained until his fourteenth year. At this time his mother died, and he shortly afterwards proceeded to Rome to continue his studies at the Jesuit college in that city. When he was 18 years of age he secured the first prize for chemistry and physics. His aptitude for natural science in no way interfered with his taste for literature and his classical studies, and even early days he was remarkable for the elegance and purity of his Latin which subsequently found such notable expression not only in his encyclicals and ecclesiastical work, but in poetry. He obtained in 1831 the degree of doc tor of divinity, and entered the Academy of Noble Ecclesiastics to study law and diplomacy, and thus qualify himself for joining what may be termed the papal diplomatic service, and ome conversant with the system of spiritual government. In 1857 Joachim Pecci received the

sub-diaconate and deaconate and on March 14 of the same year Gregory XVI. made him a domestic prelate, his first promotion, with the title of monsignor. On Dec. 23, 1834, he was ordained priest by Cardinal Odesalchi, saying his first Mass in the chapel of St. Stanislaus, at the Jesuit noviciate of St. Andrew. In July, 1837, Mgr. Pecci was named governor of the papal province of Benevento, and like Sixtus V., busied himself with the suppres-

sion of brigandage.
From Benevento Mgr. Pecci was transferred to the archbishopric of Perugia, where he remained for a year half.
