## PATIENT SUES SURGEON

Woman Wants \$30,000 Because Gauze Sponge Was Sewed Up Inside of Her.

Pittsburg, June 10. — Mrs. John Davis, of Connellsville, today began suit for \$30,000 against Dr. J. P. Kerr, of this city.

Mrs. Davis alleged that she became ill in June, 1908, and her family physician recommended that she undergo an operation at the hands of Dr. Kerr, which she did the following July 24.

She remained in Mercy Hospital, Pittsburg, until the following Oct. 13, constantly attended by Dr. Kerr.

After her discharge from the hospital she suffered pains, and last May 16 she called another physician, who opened her old wound and took from it a piece of gauze sponge measuring about eleven by four and a half inches, which had been sewed up in her abdomen.

Mrs. Davis alleges that this sponge had been carelessly left there by Dr. Kerr and that it caused her to become a physical wreck.

## ARREST ALLEGED ASSASSINS

Bloodhounds Trail Men From Scene of Ed. Callahan Shooting to Another County.

Lexington, Ky., June 11. — Sheriff Breck Crawford, of Breathitt County, accompanied by Capt. V. G. Milliken and his two famous bloodhounds from Lexington and a posse of twelve deputies, late this afternoon arrested Ellisha Smith and Levi Johnson in Perry County border and charged them with the attempted assassination of Former Sheriff Ed. Callahan.

The men were trailed to the house in which they were arrested by the bloodhounds. The dogs hit the trail in the rear of the coal bank, whence the shots were fired and started in the direction of Perry County. A short distance from the Callahan home it was found that the men had mounted their horses and ridden away, and at this point the dogs took up the trail of the horses and continued on into Perry County.

The officers learned from people living along the road that Smith and Johnson had passed and as they knew nothing of the shooting at the time they readily furnished the information.

Since the shooting of Callahan word has been received by the family that it was the purpose of the anti-Callahan faction to exterminate the entire family. The Callahan home is heavily guarded day and night. Circuit Judge Adams will press his request to Governor Wilson to send a company of state militia to Jackson to preserve order during the present term of court.

The men arrested today are known to be staunch henchmen of the Deaton faction, while Smith is a close relative of John Smith, who confessed to

## MAY GRAFT LIMBS ON MAN

But Only From Living or Recently Dead Bodies.

Paris, June 10.—Professor Pozzi, the eminent French gynecologist, described today to the Academy of Medicine Dr. Carrel's experiments at the Rockefeller Institute in transplanting organs and grafting limbs.

He told of his success in grafting to a fox terrier the hind leg amputated from another fox terrier and also of the grafting of dogs' paws.

He quoted Dr. Carrel as being unhesitatingly of the opinion that a man could be grafted with a limb amputated from another man or from a corpse of a person just killed by violence.

Dr. Carrel, however, was unwilling to draw hasty conclusions regarding the transfer of the organs of dumb animals to man. He had refused the requests of two patients to replace an arm and a kidney respectively.

## TORONTO BOY DROWNED.

Toronto, June 11.—Thomas, the 6-year-old son of William Patterson, 18 Portland street, was drowned in the bay yesterday, the body being recovered shortly after the accident.

The little fellow was throwing stones from the wharf, when he slipped and fell into the water, sinking at once.

## TO SURVEY FORESTS.

Toronto, June 10.—Professor Fernow, dean of the faculty of forestry of the University of Toronto, who has been selected to make a survey and report upon the forest resources of Nova Scotia, has chosen as his assistants Dr. Howe and J. White, lecturers in the faculty of forestry at the university, and H. B. Ayers, a Canadian, now a forestry specialist in the University of Minnesota. The party leave for Nova Scotia on the 25th inst., to enter upon its first season's work.
