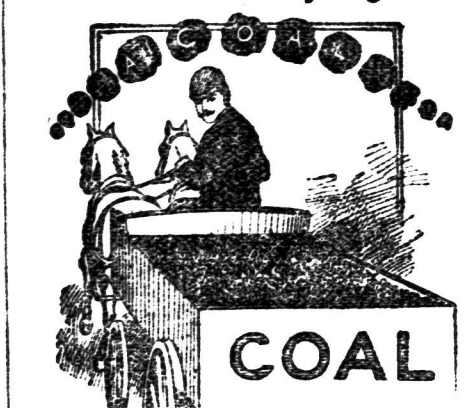

ASK PEOPLE FOR \$60,000 MORE

Bylaw for Storm Sewer Is to Be Placed Before the Electors January Next.

ROW OVER INSULATORS

Anti-Dumping Clause, It Is Found, Applies to Supplies for the City's Niagara Power Plant.

A bylaw for a storm sewer system will be voted on at the municipal elections. At the council meeting last evening a communication was received from city engineer Graydon recommending that \$60,000 be set aside for this purpose. This, he thought, would be sufficient to make a good beginning in the work, and he estimated that it would cost perhaps \$15,000 more to finish it. Mr. Graydon also recommended that Mr. George Taylor, an engineer of Toronto, be employed for two or three months to assist Assistant Engineer Wright in taking levels and obtaining the other information necessary for such a scheme. The council accepted the idea, and referred the part regarding the employment of an engineer to No. 2 committee, and the city solicitor was instructed to prepare the necessary bylaw.

Trouble Over Insulators.
The council found itself in difficulty with the customs authorities over the purchase of insulators from the Locke Insulator Company, of Victor, N. Y. When the city purchased them the price in Victor was \$22 per hundred. This figure was agreed to. The Government investigated and discovered that the usual price for the insulators was \$32 per hundred, and according to the anti-dumping act, the city would be required to pay duty on the goods at \$32 per hundred. The difference amounted to about \$145. The matter was referred to Mr. George Taylor, Ald. Stewart and City Solicitor Meredith for solution.

The council have hopes that they may be able to secure a reduction of the duty. The price paid for the insulators was the regular price throughout the United States, owing to a rate of duty, and was not made for Canadian trade alone.

The Dray Stand.
The petition of the wholesale merchants and property owners on York street put in another petition against the dray stands, but it was filed without comment.

Mayor Stevely ruled that it would take a two-thirds vote to open the question again, so the letter of the Wholesale Merchants' Association, of Ald. Garratt and Ald. Saunders.

Proposed Abattoir.
The abattoir question came up again. A petition was received from the Farmers' Market regarding the committee to go and find a place for the right to establish an abattoir to be transferred from the corporation to a private individual or company. There was no objection to this in the committee, and the Government will be asked to make the change.

Engineer Sidon recommended the appointment of a committee to look after the trees when power wires are being put in. No. 2 committee will look after this matter.

Natural Gas.
Ald. Fitzgerald wanted to know if there were any reports from the committee that visited the gas fields. "I want to know if in any report," asked Ald. Fitzgerald, "it is stated that the gas is getting natural gas at 25 cents per thousand feet, and I wondered if we could not get some of it."

Mayor Stevely stated that no committee of the council had been named this year, and none had inspected the fields.

Contract Not Signed.
Ald. Saunders asked if the contract between the city and Hon. Adam Beck for the creation of a distribution station had been signed yet, and asked what was the delay.

Mayor Stevely declared that he had asked City Solicitor Meredith about this, and he was informed that the solicitor for Mr. Beck could not be located to complete the agreement. The fault was not the city's, but Mr. Beck's.

Ald. Garratt moved in connection with this a motion that the committee be instructed to secure a signed agreement with Mr. Beck before the next meeting of the council. The motion carried.

Waterworks Plant.
"Is the new waterworks plant going to be ready next spring, or will we be in the same position that we were last summer?" asked Ald. Rose.

"It is not probable that it will be ready," said Mayor Stevely. "Chairman Jones, of the water commission, has given instructions that the temporary pipes and mains be left in the ground until next spring or summer, if necessary."

Langarth Street Sewer.
The Langarth street sewer matter came up, and a petition was presented against the recommendation of the committee to make the connection with the Cathcart street sewer. Mr. J. C. Judd explained that there had been a misapprehension as to what the committee meant. He had, however, had a talk with those opposed, and had explained it to them. He thought the clause should be passed, and there would be no trouble in obtaining the signatures of those opposed to the proposition when they understood it. The clause was passed.

Firemen's Boots.
The tenders for rubber boots were opened, and were awarded to Norval Wainwright at \$4 per pair. The Gutta Percha Rubber Company was awarded the contracts for rubber coats at \$5.50 each, and for 4 hydrant gates at \$11 and \$9 each.

The city engineer was instructed to

obtain the cost of removing the electric light on Briscoe street further east.

Grant for Fireman.
A large petition was presented to the council asking for a grant to ex-Fireman Burgess, who is suffering from muscular rheumatism caused by exposure at fire. No. 3 committee will deal with the matter.

Fixed Assessment Wanted.
R. C. Williams, of the Ontario Spring Bed and Mattress Company, wrote asking for a fixed assessment. Manufacturers' committee.

Merryweather & Sons wrote regarding the purchase of new fire engines and apparatus. No. 3.

The smoke nuisance bylaw was sent back to No. 1 committee to consider before being given final readings.

Municipal Elections.
A bylaw appointing the poll clerks, polling places, and deputy-returning officers for the coming municipal elections was passed three readings. The Bell Telephone Company agreement was given two readings, as were also the underground system bylaw and the board of control bylaw, both of which will be voted on in January next.

The committee reports were passed with little or no change. Those present were Mayor Stevely, Ald. Ferguson, Ald. Beattie, Ald. Garratt, Ald. Stewart, Ald. Fitzgerald, Ald. Saunders, Ald. Rose, Ald. Gerry, and City Clerk Baker.

TWO OFFICERS INSPECT WOLSELEY BARRACKS

Generals Cotton and Lake Are Going Through the District at Present.

General Cotton and General Percy Lake arrived in the city yesterday and spent the day in inspecting Wolseley Barracks, where everything was found satisfactory. They left this afternoon at 2 o'clock for Woodstock, where they will make an inspection of the Twenty-Second Regiment this evening. Returning to London late tonight they leave for St. Thomas tomorrow to inspect the Twenty-Fifth Regiment. On Thursday last an inspection will be made of the Twenty-Fourth Regiment at Chatham and on Friday the Twenty-Fifth of Windsor will be visited. The inspection of the Windsor regiment will complete the annual inspection of the district, and the officers will return to Toronto.

NO MEETING UNTIL AFTER THE DEPUTATION

Delegation in Favor of Sunday Cars Will See Premier Whitney.

There were various reports about the city yesterday in regard to a meeting to be held in the interest of Sunday cars last night. A number of people went to the Bank of Toronto rooms. There was a report that a meeting was to be held in the Y. M. C. A. and some people went there. It turned out, however, that there was nothing doing at either place. Inquiry elicited the information that no meeting had been called, and will not be until this in favor of Sunday cars, and a delegation to interview Premier Whitney.
