May Not Sell the Small Loaves When Joined Together.

Toronto Magistrate Thinks Legislation Designed to Check Dishonesty.

Toronto, July 29. - "Small bread" means "individual" loaves sold in any weight not exceeding twelve ounces, and a large loaf subdivided by workweight, are not "small bread," but are fine imposition. To be sold as small bread these portions, each less than 12 ounces in weight must be divided when sold. If a person asks for a loaf of bread he must still get the 24 or 48 ounce loaf, no matter what the price.

Judgment in Test Case. This was the decision handed out by Magistrate Kingsford this morning in the vexed question of the bread cases, which has been occupying the minds of bakers and public for some weeks. This decision was reached, in a test case against the Nasmith Company, who were charged with selling large loaves subdivided into four sections, each weighing ten ounces, and calling each section "small bread," conforming to the regulations of the Nickle bill as being under 12 ounces. conviction was registered, the nominal fine of \$5 being imposed.

To Prevent Dishenesty. "If for any reason there is a demand for quantities less than 24 ounces, the bakers have the opportunity of supplying it in separate portions, not more than 12 ounces each. To allow them to join together two or more of these small pieces less than 12 ounces and sell such pieces joined together would give the opportunity to a dishonest baker of selling a customer as a loaf less than 24 ounces, which is exactly what the act desires to pre-
