NO WORD RECEIVED
FROM MR. PUGSLEYMinister of Public Works Has
Not Said When He Will
Visit London.

No further word has been received from Hon. William Pugsley as to the probable date of his visit to London. The board of trade has sent him an invitation, and the municipalities of St. Thomas, Elgin County and Port Stanley have also sent a request to him to come to the city.

So far no definite word has been obtained from him, but it is expected that he will accept, and that a meeting will be arranged some time in October or November.

In the meantime, Port Burwell residents have not been idle. They are not pleased at the efforts made to build up Port Stanley at their expense, and they are preparing a deputation to force the claims of Port Burwell to more consideration on the part of the Government.

They also claim that they have the best of the argument, and that Port Burwell will be the harbor to be improved if anything is to be done.

EDITOR MARCHAND DEAD
 Was One of the Most Prominent French-Canadian Journalists.

 Montreal, Sept. 17.—The death took place suddenly at St. Johns, Que., last evening of Gabriel Marchand, member of the Quebec Legislature for St. Johns, and editor of Canada Franciscan. Mr. Marchand was stricken with heart failure in his office, and died shortly after being removed here. He was 51 years of age and was the son of the late Hon. F. G. Marchand, at one time premier of Quebec. Madame Dandane, wife of a senator, is a sister. The late Mr. Marchand was one of the ablest of French-Canadian journalists of the province.

JUDGE FREES GIRL.
 Quebec, Sept. 17.—Judge Charles Langelier rendered judgment in the case against Henriette Gilbert, a young girl charged with having poisoned an 8-months-old child, of Levis, who had been left in her care.

Judge Langelier dismissed the charge and set the young girl free, although she will have to remain in jail for some time, having been found guilty of robbery.

TUMBLE THREE FLOORS
WHILE IN A SLEEPToronto Carpenter Meets With Tragic
Death in Odd Way.

 Toronto, Sept. 17.—James Dykeman, 30 years of age, and a carpenter by occupation, fell three stories from his bedroom window at 150 Queen street east about 2 a.m. today, and received injuries from which he died soon after being taken to St. Michael's Hospital. It is not known how the accident happened, but it is supposed the man fell out of the window while asleep. Dykeman, it is said, was married, but separated from his wife.

NEW BALKAN ALLIANCE

Rumania and Turkey Line Up Against
the Bulgarians.

Paris, Sept. 17.—The Matin says today that Turkey has decided to make a secret military convention with Rumania, by which the Rumanian army will aid Turkey in its Bulgarian attack. The Matin says the convention was concluded after the inspiration of Austria and Germany.

TIPLISS BARBERS

Also They Will Be Known as Tonsorial
Doctors.

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 17.—A movement is on foot among barbers themselves for "tipless barbers" and the elevation of their profession to the degree of "D. T." or tonsorial doctor. J. C. Shanley, general organizer of the International Barbers' Union, is here promoting the idea. He declares that in 19 states some sort of a state board examination is already required of barbers, and many are accustomed, like medical men, to send on monthly or quarterly bills.

WEDGED IN THE PILOT

Engineer Finds Bodies of Two Dead
Men on Reaching Depot.

 Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 17.—Tightly wedged in the pilot of a Royal Blue express train on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, the bodies of two men, badly mangled, were found by those of Winfield D. Cullin and Jesse Cullin, of Baltimore, Md., were found early today when the train arrived in this city.

In addition to the bodies, parts of which was missing, a piece of a horse blanket and a portion of what is believed to have been a carriage wheel, were also found on the locomotive.

In pieces of the clothing on the bodies was found letters containing the names and addresses above given. These letters are the only clue the railroad people have as to the identity of the men. The fact that the men were killed by the train was not discovered until the train reached this city.

BIG CNES COMING

Eastbound Atlantic Liners Carrying
Some Personages.

London, Sept. 17.—The steamers Lusitania, Baltic and Laurentic, which sailed from British ports today for America carried 5,700 passengers. The Baltic's travellers included John E. Redmond, leader of the Irish Nationalists, and his associates, T. P. O'Connor and Jos. Devlin, who are to tour America in the interest of Irish national movement.

The St. Louis, which will also sail today, carried among her passengers Hajji Mohammed, a prominent subject who is permitted a nominal authority over the Sulu Archipelago. On his visit to the United States he will combine business with pleasure, disposing of some of the pearls of which he possesses an abundance.

NEW MOTOR REGULATION

Canadian Customs Take Stringent
Measures to Collect on Repairs.

 Windsor, Sept. 17.—A stringent customs regulation enforcement has gone into effect here intended to suppress the repairing and equipping of Canadian-owned machines in Detroit. Canadian car owners have been in the habit of purchasing accessories and having repairs made in Detroit. Hereafter a complete record of every machine will have to be shown the inspectors when a machine goes across the river to Detroit, and will be held by the customs inspectors until the car is brought back. In this way any new equipment or repairs made on the other side will be immediately apparent and made subject to duty.
