THE CLAUSE HE WOULDN'T DODGE. ANY persons have asked during the discussion on Panama canal tolls wherein the proposal to exempt American vessels from the payment of tolls conflicted with the treaty made by the United States with Great Britain.

The provision in the Hay-Pauncefote treaty which refers to Panama canal traffic put the thing clearly enough. It

"The canal shall be free and open to the vessels of commerce and of war of all nations observing these rules ON TERMS OF ENTIRE EQUALITY, so that there shall be no discrimination against any such nation or its citizens or subjects in respect of the conditions or charges of traffic or otherwise. Such conditions and charges of traffic shall be just and equitable.'

It was upon this clause that President Woodrow Wilson based his conception of national honor at the risk of wrecking his party. When such lieutenants as Clark and Underwood bitterly assailed the proposal, the bravery and keen sense of fair play of the President looms large in his nation's history.

Both Lord Pauncefote, who represented Great Britain, and John Hay, who represented the United States in the making of the treaty, are dead. But Joseph Choate, former American ambassador to England, who participated in the treaty negotiations, is still living, and when he was asked to place his interpretation upon this clause of the treaty, he referred graciously to the deaths of the framers of the agreement

"As the lips of both these diplematists and great patriots, who were true to their own countries and each regardful of the rights of the other, are sealed in death, I think that it is proper that I should say what I think both of them if they were here teday would say-that the clause in the Panama toll act exempting coastwise American shipping from the payment of tolls is in direct viola-

tion of the treaty. 'I venture to say that in the whole course of the negotiations of this particular treaty, no claim, ne sugestion was made that there should be any exemption of anybody."

T IS rather amusing to hear the University of Toronto talk of "facing a erisis," but more curious are its proposals for surmounting the crisis. The cry is that, the university being overcrowded, more buildings must be put up at a cost of a million and a half and a corresponding increase must be made in the annual Provincial subsidy.

Toronto University is termed the Provincial university, but it serves the city of Toronto to fully twice the extent that it does the Province. Let the university get something from Toronte. If the western part of Ontario is to be given a fair opportunity in higher education, the Western University should be built The ... improvement of Western would be a better thing also for the University of Toronto, relieving it of the congestion in attendance. Concentration of higher educational facilities at Toronto has already gone too far for Toronto University as well as for the Province, and it would be criminal to carry it yet further.
