## REV. JAS. T. DOWLING DIES AT PETROLEA

Had Been Baptist Minister in  
This District for Forty-  
Five Years.

Petrolea, Feb. 24.—The funeral of Rev. J. T. Dowling, one of Ontario's oldest Baptist ministers, was held from his late residence this afternoon and was very largely attended. The funeral was held under Masonic auspices and was conducted by Rev. A. C. Bingham, of Petrolea, and Rev. Mr. Grimshaw, of Toronto.

Rev. Mr. Dowling was 78 years old, and died after an illness lasting over several months. For 45 years he was in the active ministry, holding pastorates at Niagara Falls, Uxbridge, Sterling, Wicklow, Colborne, Salford, and Moosomin, N. W. T. As well as being an able preacher of the gospel, Mr. Dowling was an artist of much ability, and in both capacities was widely known throughout the Province. Since retiring from the active ministry, thirteen years ago, Mr. Dowling had resided in Petrolea with his family. He is survived by his wife, two sons and two daughters.

## SHOT AT OFFICER AND MADE ESCAPE

Charles Morgan, a Negro, Eludes Police at St. Catharines.

St. Catharines, Feb. 23.—Police Sergeant James Brett, while attempting to arrest Charles, or "Troubles" Morgan, a young negro, tonight, was shot by the fugitive. Although the bullet was fired at close range, it only struck the sergeant's hand and grazed his coat. Morgan got away, but the city and surrounding district is being scoured for him. Morgan is wanted for the alleged theft of a horse and buggy from a livery establishment at Niagara Falls, N. Y., Feb. 14. That day he led Chief Green and several officers of the local force and the Ontario police in automobiles a chase for miles through the surrounding country, finally doubling back to the border, and turned the horse without a driver onto the upper steel arch bridge at the Falls, the outfit finally reaching the opposite shore, the river. Morgan has not been seen since until tonight.

## NEW POTTERY PLANT FOR EGMONDVILLE

Company Formed to Take Over Fine  
Deposits of Clay.

## GOING TO WINDSOR

New Two-Million Dollar Alkali Company Has Purchased Land.

Windsor, Feb. 23.—The Canadian Alkali Company, Limited, a \$2,000,000 corporation, has been granted a charter by the Province of Ontario to operate an alkali plant on land recently purchased near the holdings of the United States Steel Corporation in Sandwich. The company will develop the salt beds underlying the property, and the chemical treatment will manufacture salt, caustic soda, lye and chloride of lime. The officers are: James Inglis, president; William McEwen, of Toronto, vice-president; M. G. Bergman, Detroit, treasurer; and H. S. Dodson, secretary and general manager. These officers, with A. L. Stephens, of Detroit, constitute the board of directors. The company will open offices in the Mann Block here, and also in Detroit.

## DIED AT LUCRNOW

George Irwin Had Been Seriously Ill for Some Time.

## HANGED HIMSELF

George Campbell, of Lucknow, Found Dead in His Barn.

He then stood upon a barrel and kicked it away. He had been crippled by rheumatism, and was subject to fits of melancholia. He was 54 years old and married and had only one. An inquest will be held Monday morning.

## CREATED MATTER OUT OF NOTHING

Some Remarkable Results Are  
Claimed by Noted English  
Scientist.

## MYSTERY OF AN ATOM

Sir John Thompson Says That Every  
Atom Is Possessed of an Inner  
Core.

London, Feb. 23.—In a lecture last week entitled "The Birth of an Atom," Sir James Crichton-Browne said that Sir William Ramsay and Prof. Collie and Patterson had announced that they had practically created matter out of nothing, or, at any rate, out of energy after the passage of electric discharges through tubes filled with pure hydrogen. Neon and helium, two gases, had been found, and their presence was accounted for either by the transmutation of hydrogen into them—that is to say, by the transmutation of one element into another—or by their creation de novo by the electrons.

### Found New Gas.

Sir Joseph Thompson had suggested said the lecturer, that the neon and helium might have come from particles of less than one-seventeenth thousandth of the weight of an atom of hydrogen thrown off from the materials of which the tubes were made, but that was still sub judice. Sir Joseph Thompson, in the course of his observations, had discovered a new gas and had shown how atoms might be connected. Sir Joseph had said that all his electrical experiments tended to confirm his conception that every atom consisted of an inner core in which resided its unchanging individuality, and an outer shell which brought about the variations that the elementary atom went through when chemically combined with other atoms.

### Elements of Atoms.

Surely, added Sir James Crichton-Browne, that description recalled to the biologist the ultimate organic cell with its inner core or nucleus and its outer shell. Sir Joseph Thompson had also said that an atom was a particle of an element having a certain unchangeable individuality of its own, but subject to modification by the habits acquired by association with other atoms. Surely that must recall to the biologist the living being with its unchangeable heredity subject to modification by associations with other living beings.

It was, said Sir James, fanciful to trace in the March number of the great archetypal ideas that were common to the organic and the inorganic world, the study of which lifted us above shallow materialism and deepened in us the sense of reverence.

## TOO MANY LIBERTIES FOR WESTERN WOMEN

Declare Selections From the  
Diary of Deposed Turkish  
Sultan.

Berlin, Feb. 23.—Another selection of chapters from the diary of Abdul Hamid, appears in the March number of The Review Nord and Sud giving his views on women. The ex-sultan of Turkey says: "The countless divorces and scandals in Europe and America show that many men in those countries incline to polygamy. The West has an entire misapprehension regarding the position of woman in Turkey. Even though woman continues to be degraded from taking part in Turkish public life, and is compelled to leave everything to men she at any rate is an autocrat at home."

"As I observe the stern imperious facts regarding western women, a comparison with them easily favors our women. Why do the people of the west criticize our women? Which is more sacrificing or more beautiful, the Oriental woman or the European? In Turkey woman belongs to her home, belongs to a man alone; in Europe she has too many liberties to remain womanly. If only half one reads in the newspapers and books about women, he is true then the lot of the men there must be truly lamentable."

## ENDED HER LIFE

Miss Carrie McMurray, While Delirious  
With Fever, Drank Carbolic Acid.

Thornsdale, Feb. 22.—Miss Carrie McMurray, a graduate of last year's class of nurses at Victoria Hospital Training School, London, was found dead at her home here today. It is believed that while delirious from the effects of typhoid fever, with which she came home ill on Wednesday, she drank the contents of a bottle of carbolic acid. Miss McMurray was 25 years old, and after graduating last spring, went to Michigan. While nursing a patient, she was attacked with symptoms of typhoid, and securing the services of a nurse, brought her home with her. The nurse, sleeping in a room adjoining that of Miss McMurray, went in to see her several times on Friday night, and early Saturday morning, but noticed nothing wrong.

Miss McMurray was a daughter of the late Wm. McMurray, and besides her mother, leaves a sister, who resides in Thamesford, and three brothers, William, Samuel and Sol. The funeral will be held on Monday afternoon.

## FATAL PARALYSIS

Henry Crowe Had a Stroke About Two Months Ago.

Port Elgin, Feb. 24.—The funeral of Henry Crowe, held on Sunday to the Mount Hope Cemetery, was conducted by Rev. A. H. O'Brien, of the Baptist Church. Mr. Crowe was 67 years old, and had been in poor health for some years, suffering mainly from epilepsy. About two months ago he was stricken with paralysis, which was the direct result of his demise. ## STANDARD PLAN FOR ALL BOILERS

Hereafter Will Be Given Thorough Inspection When Being Completed.

Toronto, Feb. 24.—After July 1 this year every boiler manufactured in Ontario, apart from railway and steam boilers, must be made along standard lines, and stand a thorough inspection not only upon completion, but during construction.

This is the effect of the new provincial boiler regulations that have just received final approval. The regulations are patterned on those of England, and are almost identical with those now in force in British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan. This uniformity is the result of the conference of provincial officials held in Regina three years ago, and opens the way for reciprocity in inspection certificates.

At the present time there is no boiler inspection in Ontario during construction, except with regard to steam and locomotive boilers, which are covered by separate legislation. In order to carry out the regulations three inspectors will probably be appointed, and legislation is expected this session to provide the machinery. The inspectors will work by districts, and will be allowed considerable latitude in imposing pressure for variations from the standard specifications.

The cost of the service will be partly met by the imposition of fees for approving plans.
