DIRECTIONS FOR EGG PRODUCTION

Mrs. Lawless, 1228 Dundas Street, Tells How Her Four Hens Laid 98 in 31 Days.

Here are the directions Mrs. Lawless of 1228 Dundas st. gives, to make four pullets lay ninety eggs in thirty-one days.

"First," she told the reporter who called on her, "you must have some high-class fowls," and she pointed to a couple of "blue ribbon" record-breakers strutting about in the yard. "Those have all taken prizes at the New York poultry shows."

"Second they must be kept in a place, with lots of straw around."

"Third, they must be fed properly and regularly."

"The bill of fare that Mrs. Lawless considers appropriate for her record-breakers, is: Morning, a sprinkle of oats. Noon, a slice of bread and butter, and a sprinkle of wheat."

Besides this, making pets of the chickens is essential to get the very best and, more important, the most eggs.

"Biddle" is the favourite of the Lawless coon.

"She follows me around all the while I'm in the yard," said Mrs. Lawless. Biddle laid thirty eggs in the thirty one days of January and four of them were big triple-size double-yolked ones too.

"The pullets run around in the yard and scratch in the straw of the coop, and every now and then, one of them goes into nest and lays an egg," said the owner.

"Any egg records here?" the Advertiser's egg reporter asked Mrs. Lawless. "Why no-er-lat's see now, judging by most of London's chickens, I guess maybe I have too."

"Oh yes, and what is the record?" asked the reporter getting out pad and pencil.

"Well we have twenty-five chickens," "Yes," said the reporter expectant.

"And," continued Mrs. Lawrence. "They haven't laid an egg since Nov. 1st."

BRITISH-AMERICAN WAR UNTHINKABLE

[Canadian Press.] London, Feb. 5.—The London morning papers heartily endorse the suggestions made at the meeting of the British committee for the celebration of the centenary of peace and hope that the public will respond promptly to the appeal for \$250,000.

The Times, in an editorial, says: "Anglo-American relations fortunately stand in no need of artificial sustenance."

Referring to Secretary Bryan's peace treaty the Times says: "War between Great Britain and the United States is unthinkable. With that central and indisputable fact we might well rest content, especially as the Anglo-American treaty should have taught the statesmen of both countries the folly of forcing the pace and overemphasizing facts and conditions that may safely be left to develop in their own way and at their own time."

Referring to President Wilson's proclamation, relation to Mexico, the Times considers that this will hardly bring a permanent solution of the problem, but says that whatever policy they may eventually be driven to adopt the Americans may be confident that no difficulties will be placed in their way by the British Government.

"We have had too much experience in similar predicaments," adds the Times "not to sympathize with the hesitancy of American statesmanship in the face of such a difficult situation."
