M'KAY DECLARES HYDRO FIGURES ARE REASONABLE

Per Capita Contribution in London Is Given As \$3.38.

TORONTO, June 29.—Robert McKay, counsel for the municipalities in favor of the projected hydro-electric power commission's radial railways, contributing his argument today before the royal commission inquiring into the radial projects contended that the hydro commission's method of estimating the number of people in the city was based on the size of the main terminal population, whereas the experts from the United States reached their conclusions by lumping the suburban and terminal population and considering the average number of rides for the total population.

Estimates Conservative.
Mr. McKay, who claimed that the hydro estimates of the number of people who would patronize the electric cars were conservative. To prove his argument as to the averaging of the number who would have the riding habit he contended that 20,000 people added to the suburban area outside of Toronto would give a radial more traffic than would the same 20,000 people should they be added to the city's population. That 40,000 times a very large percentage of a radial's business would be conducted with the people outside the terminal centres who had business in the city.

The London Railway.
This was substantiated, Mr. McKay claimed, by the comparative results on the London and Port Stanley line, also on the Grand River Railway in the London district the per capita contribution to the hydro had been \$3.38 in one year, and on the Grand River Railway \$3.47. These figures were for service mostly suburban. On the lines in the United States cited by witnesses at the probe with the terminal population included with the suburban per capita earnings had dropped down under \$2.

"I could show that the hydro estimates are excessively and outlandishly conservative," declared Mr. McKay, after he had given more figures in favor of hydro estimates, as against testimony given by experts from the United States.
Mr. McKay, who began his argument yesterday, had not concluded today, and he will continue tomorrow.

DISTRICT DOCTORS PASS COUNCIL EXAM

OTTAWA, June 29.—(By Canadian Press).—Dr. Robert W. Powell, registrar, announced tonight the results of the June examinations of the Medical Council of Canada, which were held this morning at Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver. FRANCE HONORS CANADIANS FOR THEIR SACRIFICE

Magnificent Bust Presented At Ottawa by Marshal Foyolle.

OTTAWA, June 29.—(By Canadian Press).—Marshal Foyolle, in the name of France, this afternoon presented to the Canadian people Rodin's bust, La France Reconnaisante (Grateful France). The ceremony took place in the railway committee room of the House of Commons and was graced by the presence of the leaders of the state, church and industry. Right Hon. C. J. Doherty, active prime minister, and Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Opposition, accepted the bust on behalf of Canada.

Regrettable Error.
Unfortunately and as Hon. Mr. Doherty explained, through a most regrettable error, the bust itself had been defined as Quebec and would be forwarded to Ottawa immediately. Instead of the bust, a photograph of it was placed on exhibition. Mr. Doherty voiced the feeling of the Canadian people when he said that the bust would be accepted, although it was not present, with the deepest spirit of gratitude and sincerity. The bust, as can be seen from the photograph, is a truly magnificent example of the sculptor's art, and as Marshal Foyolle said, depicts France victorious. On it are engraved the words: "To Canada, which has poured out the blood of her sons for the liberty of the world, from grateful France."

Largely Attended.
Marshal Foyolle and the members of the mission were escorted to the House of Commons by Hon. Mr. Doherty and members of the Government.

Among those present at the ceremony and in addition to the members of the Government, were representative of the Commons and Senate, the clergy of Ottawa, Sir Robert Borden, Mayor Frank Plant and members of the city council; Major-General J. H. McBrien, chief of the general staff; Major-General Archibald MacDonnell, commander of the Royal Military College; Commander Home, director of naval services; the justices of the supreme court of Canada, and the consuls of the United States, Belgium, China and Japan.

Marshal Foyolle was greeted with three hearty cheers. In forceful and soldierly language he paid a tribute of unstinted appreciation to the co-operation which Canada had lent France during the war.

The object of the French mission, he explained, was to express the gratitude of France for the great part Canada had played in the war.

Signal Service.
It was at Laungmarcke, he continued, Canadians had done the French army signal service. First, disregarding the rules of civilized warfare, the Germans had added to their gunfire most unexpectedly a cloud of poisonous gas. The French soldiers were blinded, intoxicated—their weapons fell from their hands. Luckily, the Canadians were there and by a quick concerted attack they diverted the German forces and, saving a bad situation, thus made a splendid debut.

"Canadians never forget," said Marshal Foyolle. "This the Germans well knew."
France wished peace profoundly, he said. Just as the victory was a common victory, so the peace now won was bound to be shared by all the Allies. France remained deeply attached to her late Allies, even though the alliance might cost her some sacrifice—and none of her allies were dearer to her than was Canada, from whom, said Marshal Foyolle, there was nothing to separate her. On the effigy were engraved the words: "To Canada who shed the blood of her sons for the liberty of the world, in token of the gratitude of France."

Praises French.
Hon. C. J. Doherty, in thanking Marshal Foyolle, the members of the mission and France for the bust, said that the French people helped to lay the foundation of the present Canada, and that the people of Canada were deeply proud of the French forefathers. The messages of gratitude from France touched the depths of the hearts of the Canadian people. Canada's debt to France in art, literature and civilization was one that she could never hope to repay. This great sentiment would enter the hearts of all those who in the future would look on the visible emblem of the feelings of France for Canada.

All Canada was speaking with one voice in welcoming the distinguished guests, and in expressing gratitude for the gift and "our love for France."
Everyone in Canada appreciated what the gift meant. The people of Canada knew the tremendous part France had played in the war. Canadians knew that France in the battles for liberty had more than 1,500,000 men in dead, had

RECORD PRICES AT GUELPH FOR SHORTHORNS

One Lot Averaged \$1,020 Each For J. E. Elliott.

GUELPH, June 29.—At a sale of imported shorthorn cattle from the herds of J. E. Elliott of Guelph, and J. A. and M. Pettitt, Freeman, Ontario, at the Winter Fair Arena here this afternoon, attended by nearly 1,000 cattlemen and buyers from Canada and the United States, 42 animals went under the hammer for \$27,715, an average of \$658.75. The highest price paid was \$1,020, by Gerrie Bros. of Elora, for Butterfly Blossom, a 2-year-old imported female, bred by J. E. Elliott, Kirton, Inverness, Scotland. This young animal was bred to Millhill's Comet, the \$32,000 bull purchased by Mr. Elliott in Scotland in 1920.

Of the animals sold, 18 head were owned by Mr. Elliott, and went for a total of \$16,325, an average of \$1,020, which, according to Prof. G. E. Day, secretary of the Dominion Shorthorn Breeders, and announced by him at the sale, is the highest average of any sale on the North American continent this year. Several of the animals sold went to American buyers, two females going to George Sterne of Albany, N. Y., two going to E. Lugsdon of Indianapolis.

TURNKEY SUSPENDED AT CHATHAM JAIL

Burroughs and Brown, Who Made Getaway, Still At Large.

CHATHAM, June 29.—William Burroughs and James Brown, who escaped from the county jail yesterday, are still at large. A report was current in the city today that the two stole a horse and rig from a Chatham Township farmer late in the night and drove to Wallaceburg, where the horse and rig were abandoned, and the men started towards Walpole Island on foot. As Count Constable Peters has been out of the city all day, on the hunt, the report could not be confirmed.

Turnkey Soffley, who was in charge of the prisoners, has been suspended pending an investigation. The two who made a getaway between midnight Sunday and 6 o'clock Monday morning are also still at large. Governor Davidson of the jail stated today that had Stanley Hallam had a couple of minutes more of a start he would have overtaken Burroughs and Brown. Stanley and William Hallam were taken to Windsor today by Essex officers to give evidence in the trial of Thomas Bulmer.

PANIC REIGNS AS STROMBOLI ERUPTS ROCKS

Inhabitants of Island Terror-Stricken by Activity of Volcano.

MESSINA, Italy, June 29.—The volcano Stromboli, on Stromboli Island, off the north coast of Sicily, burst into wild activity last night and terror fills the island. The molten rocks and sulphurous gases pouring from the crater it is feared, may spell impending doom to the panic-stricken inhabitants. The people of the island, stranded by the uncanny behavior of the volcano during the last three days, are congregating on the shores preparing for an attempt at flight, but waiting in the hope that the volcano will subside. There are not sufficient craft to carry away all the inhabitants of the affected district and the Italian Government has dispatched several destroyers from Messina to the scene of the eruption. Arrangements have been made, if conditions on the island become more threatening, to transport the entire population to Messina.

IRISH FARMERS FIGHT LIFTING OF EMBARGO

Want to Retain Their Monopoly of British Trade.
LONDON, June 29.—(By the Associated Press).—A regular battery of arguments supported by reams of evidence has been brought by the Canadian Government before the royal commission which is considering the question of the removal of the embargo on the importation of store cattle into the United Kingdom.
Dr. Simon F. Tolmie, Canadian minister of agriculture, who is here with a staff of experts to prove that the Canadian herds are free from disease, spent the whole day on the witness stand. He declared that testimony that pleuro-pneumonia had been discovered in a shipment of Canadian cattle in 1897, when the embargo was imposed, had been disproved, and he argued that at any rate the Imperial Government should carry out its promise, made in the early days of the war, that the embargo would be removed.
The minister bluntly announced that should the Imperial Government fail to fulfill its promise, Canada must endeavor to secure a market in the United States for her surplus, and that this trade had already resulted in Canadian breeders looking to the United States for pedigreed stock, which here-

fore has been bought in the United Kingdom.
A number of English ranch owners from the Western plains are here to support Dr. Tolmie, who, however, has a hard fight, as the Irish farmers, who now have a monopoly of the store cattle trade with England, and English and Scottish breeders are opposed to the removal of the embargo.
Labor is supporting the Canadians on the ground that the importation of Canadian cattle means cheaper meat.

M'FADDEN IS STILL HOPEFUL

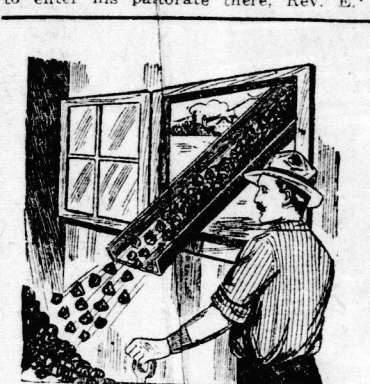
"Tell My Folks Not To Worry," Says Young Londoner.

TORONTO, June 29.—"Tell my folks not to worry. The judge believed that I didn't shoot Sabine. Surely Ottawa will believe it too!"
This message was sent by McFadden to his people in London, Ont., through Fletcher Kerr, McFadden's counsel. Pending the outcome of an appeal to the department of justice at Ottawa for the commutation of McFadden's sentence, the prisoner is said to spend his days in a cheerful spirit.
