VOLUNTARY GIVING SAVES HARD WORK

Mrs. McIntosh Tells Leper Mission Thankoffering Brings \$34.50.

"If people would give more, as a matter of fact, out of their own incomes, it wouldn't be necessary to have so much hard work getting up money-making entertainments for missionary and other objects," was a statement made by Mrs. W. R. McIntosh in delivering an address Tuesday afternoon at the annual thank-offering meeting of the London auxiliary to the Leper Mission. The speaker drew attention to the present hopeful outlook for missions in all parts of the world, the eager response that the message of Christianity is finding. The case of China seeking guidance from the Christian world in her big industrial projects was cited as an especially hopeful sign of the times. Emphasis was laid on the power of prayer in all missionary work.

The thank-offering amounted to \$34.50, apart from the subscriptions of three members to support three untainted children. A legacy of \$100 from the late Mrs. M. Z. Dent was gratefully acknowledged.

Mrs. George Wood presided and two new members were received, Mrs. McIntosh and Mrs. R. J. Webster.

TO GET RID OF MOTHS. Dear Cynthia Grey,—I should esteem it a favor if any of your correspondents could tell me how to get rid of buffalo moths. I continually turn my clothes out and air in the sun, and have tried several things without success. The stupid little things will stay with me, much to my discomfort and detriment to some of my clothing. Thanking you sincerely yours, ENGLISH VIOLET.

The following are remedies sent in by readers: 1. An ounce of gum camphor and one of the powdered shell of red pepper macerated in eight ounces of strong alcohol for several days, then strained. With this tincture, the fur or cloth are sprinkled over and rolled up in sheets. Instead of the pepper, bitter apple may be used. 2. To drive away moths, wet little wads of cotton batting with oil of cedar and place them in the closets and drawers. 3. Some moth preventives are camphor, naphthalene, cloves or a cloth wrung out in spirits of turpentine and put into the drawers. 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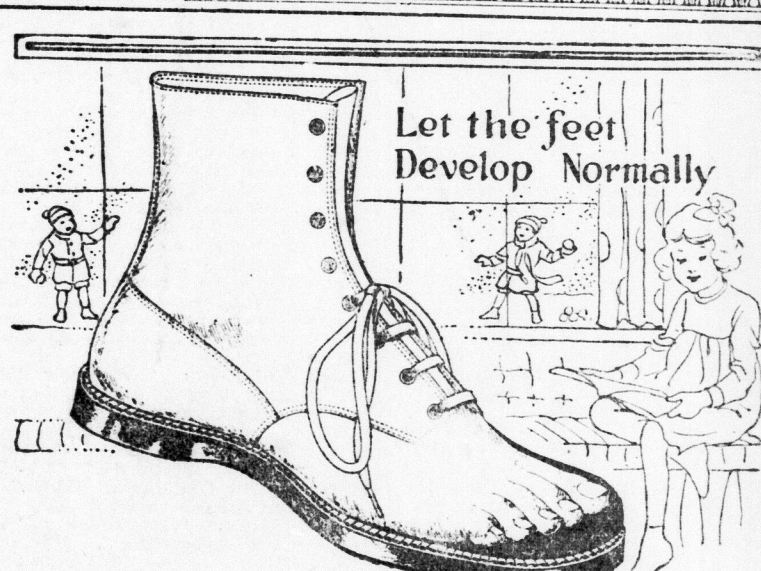
