THE CITY.

The purchasers were a Chicago firm, R. Dunsmuir & Sons of this city made an offer of 100 for the bonds.

A delegation from the Mennonite settlers in Manitoba are in this province looking for land on which to settle 300 families, who are anxious to move here, as they find the winters in Manitoba too long and too severe. These delegates (Messrs. Franz Deitel, Johann W. Deitel, Franz Deitel, W. Oakley, W. E. Dowlen, F. Burnett, J. E. Carden, Mr. Ronald, R. J. Woods, Frank Grantham, Geo. W. Matthews, P. Callan, M. Owing to the strike a great many white men are out of employment, and according to the report of the Danube started for Victoria over 100 of them will very shortly come down to the Fraser river to seek employment there. The Indians own most of the fishing boats, and think little of earning a livelihood.
