Liberal Government is Sustaine By a Very Slim

Conservatives Gain Many Seats and the Result Is Very Close.

Exact Numbers of Each 8ide In the House Not Yet Known.

Toronto, May 29 .- With returns from half a dozen constituencies somewhat incomplete, and one constituency, Manitoulin, not heard from at all, the Ross government has been apparently sustained by a majority of one or two. Tonight's figures show 50 Liberals returned, including all the ministers, and 45 Con-

jority.

Prominent Libera's defeated are: Liberal whip McKeon of North Essex; Garpenter in North Norfolk, and Dr. McKay of South Oxford. The result in South Oxford was a surprise to the Liberals, it being the first time since confederation that it has elected a Conservative. No leading Conservatives were defeated. Among the new figures who will be seen in the House will be two former Conservative members. Dr. Willoughby, of East Northumberland and St. John of West York.
