Burned-Reformatory Workshops De-MONTBEAL, Feb. 20-Two extensive fires ccurred here to-day; one in the large wholesale grocery and spirit store of D. Masson and Co., St. Paul street. The conflagration originated on a lower flat and soon extended to all parts of the building, notwithstanding every effort to subdue it by the city brigade. The premises are completely gutted and the loss is estimated at
