JURORS AT CORONERS' INQUESTS

York County Council Thinks That They Should Be Paid—Circulating Libraries in the Rural Schools.

It is thought the County Council will conclude their business to-day. The proceedings yesterday consisted chiefly of presentation of reports of various committees. The new bridge over the Highland Creek was spoken of as a handsome structure. A bill of \$1413.37 was sent to the Council for repairs on the Court House. The commissioners were unable to certify to the correctness of the bill, they refused payment.

A petition will be presented to the Legislative Assembly, asking that a law be passed compelling all plaintiffs in suits against the county to furnish security for costs. The report of the Commissioners of the Industrial Home, Newmarket, was satisfactory. The home was reported to be in a healthy condition, not a single patient being under the doctor's care at the time of the last visit of the commissioners. The general condition of the home and outbuildings was found to be good. An effort will be made to have the waterworks and fire alarm system of Newmarket connected with the home.
