Voters' Lists Being Prepared

Most of the enumerators whose duty it is to prepare the voters' lists for the coming election have been appointed by the Returning Officers and are now busy compiling the lists, which will be posted 15 days before the day of polling.

Those entitled to vote at the December election are as follows:—

(1) All those (except in the cities) whose names are on the Ontario voters' lists as revised in 1916. In cities a special and entirely new lists will be prepared.

(2) All women (except Indian women) who are wives, widows, sisters and daughters of the Canadian forces overseas and naval forces in Canada or Britain, whether the members of such forces have been at any time resident in Canada or not.

(3) All electors or voters, male and female, must be 21 years of age, and British subjects by birth or naturalization and according to the War-time Elections Act, 1917, section 32, the elector is to reside for one year in the Province and have his residence and domicile in the electoral district for 30 days, both of said periods to be fixed by reference to the date of the writ of election, 1917.

The duties of enumerators, of which there will be one for each polling subdivision, are clearly stated. In rural constituencies the enumerators shall prepare the list from the revised provincial lists of 1916, which in turn are based upon municipal rolls. There the duty of the enumerators in the main particulars will be to remove the names of those who are disfranchised as enemy aliens and to add to the lists the names of the women relatives of soldiers who are to receive the vote.

Women and others not now on the list are asking how they are to make sure of getting their names on. The enumerators are now preparing the lists. It is conceivable that some woman may be missed. How is she to know? The answer is that 15 days before the election the lists are to be posted in two of the most public places within the polling sub-division, one being the postoffice. Anyone in doubt must read these lists and see whether her name is there. If not she must go before the enumerator on one of ten days before the election and make a statutory declaration of qualification. The enumerator must state, in a notice attached to the lists, where he is to be found and at what time of day for two hours consecutively every day for 10 days before the election and all day election day.
