A Fire Sweeps Constantinople

(Canadian Press Cable.)

CONSTANTINOPLE, Julie 3 — A great fire today swept over stamboul, the Mohammedan section of Constantinoplé, at 8 o'clock this evening the fire was still burning, but it was hoped that its further advance had been checked. Two thousand houses and several mosques were burned. A wind lane was cleared by the flames from the walls of the old Seraglio palace grounds as far as little Aya mosque, a distance of three quarters of a mile. This mosque escaped destruction and the open space about it appears to have stayed the progress of the fire.

The advance of the flames toward the wealther quarters was stayed by the hippodrome and the Sultan Ahmed mosque, both of which were saved.
