

**CHAIR AND CABINET FACTORY.**—One of the most important manufactories in town is that of Mr. Louis Roenigk. For years past he has been adding one piece of machinery to another until he has now facilities for manufacturing not much inferior to some of the first-class establishments in the Province. Everything connected with the manufacture of chairs and other furniture is made on the premises, and having all the required machinery, and the best class of workmen he can supply dealers on as good terms as the largest factories in the Province.

**OTHER MANUFACTURES.**—There are other branches of manufacture established at different points on the river, which contribute largely to the prosperity of the town. We have four sash, door and blind manufactories, carried on respectively by Messrs. George Walton, A. Diamond, A. N. Pringle, and Thompson & Reddiok, giving employment to between thirty and forty men. Since the establishment of cheese factories, the demand for cheese boxes has been so great as to warrant the establishment of a factory specially devoted to this business. It is carried on by John P. Lever. A new and large woollen manufactory has been established by John Lazier, on the site of what is known as Reed's dam. It is a building four stories high, and is fitted up with the necessary machinery for the manufacture of cloths of all kinds. Another factory of the same kind is that of S. Ostrom, who has recently enlarged his premises and largely increased his facilities for business. There are three flouring mills; one occupied by Mr. James Grant, which has three run of stone, and is considered a first-class mill; Mr. James Canniff still occupies the large stone mill, just outside the limits of the town, and a better mill can scarcely be found in the County. The old Sidney mill, on Coleman's dam is occupied by Mr. James Wallace, who has every facility for flouring and gristing. In addition to the foregoing, we have the soap and candle factory of F. A. Phippen, the extensive potashery of Mr. John A. Phippen, the large distillery, owned by the Hon. Robert Read; two breweries, owned respectively by Messrs. Bennett & Bain, and Mr. L. J. Williams; and other manufactories of various kinds. As we have before said, our manufactures are yet in their infancy, and with the immense resources at our command, they can be indefinitely increased.
