Spring extra.\$4.85, ctong bakers, (Canadian) \$5.50 to \$6.25, and fine. \$4.

In medium to fair grades, however, there is less demand, but offerings of this class are by no means excessive in this market. The sale has been made of 100 pigs Morrisburg as 204c. In the Brockville . strict some active buying is new going on, at 19c for straight dairies and 21c for fall ends. The New York market, which yesterday was telegraphed weak owing to the recent mild spell, is now reported firm, probably in consequence of the change to colder weather, The exports from this port during the week were 5,174 yeakages, showing a decrease of 489 packages, as compared with those of the week prerious, and an increase of 1,813 nackages as compared with the corresponding week last year.
