GOVERNMENT POSITION

Hon. Lloyd Axworthy (Winnipeg-Fort Garry): Mr. Speaker, the Minister of Finance is quoted directly as saying: "What we're saying is that there are people who don't need it. Upper and middle income social programs cannot be afforded today." Those are not my words; those are his words.

Is that a clear statement of a position taken by your Government that you believe that these programs, which affect over 13 million Canadians, can no longer be afforded? Is that the proposition that you are going to be putting forward in the release of your social papers?

Right Hon. Brian Mulroney (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, my hon. friend knows full well that his statement is fundamentally vexatious. My hon. friend has chosen to segregate one part of a sentence from a lengthy interview.

While my hon. friend was a member of the ministry he resorted to the same notion of inviting discussion on serious matters, through white papers or other means. The Minister of Finance is attempting to initiate discussion across the country to get views that might help us in our desire to deliver services more efficiently to those who need them most. I think my hon. friend would agree with that, because I think it is a proper and reasonable course to follow, particularly when we are burdened with such an enormous federal debt.

PROGRAMS REFERRED TO BY MINISTER

Mr. Bill Blaikie (Winnipeg-Birds Hill): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Prime Minister. Would the Prime Minister be willing to tell the House what programs he thinks the Minister of Finance was referring to in the statement? Surely that could be answered without any accusations of things being distorted or taken out of context. If the Minister of Finance was trying to stimulate discussion, perhaps the Prime Minister could tell us what middle income social programs the Minister of Finance had in mind.

Right Hon. Brian Mulroney (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, perhaps once my hon. friend has had a chance to read the interview fully, and place it in its proper context, he will see, as I think any objective observer would, that the object of the exercise was precisely to invite reasonable dialogue and to avoid, to the extent humanly possible, supercilious questioning. I see we have not been fully successful.

Mr. Blaikie: Mr. Speaker, it does not seem supercilious to me to ask a specific question if the Prime Minister is interested in dialogue. We cannot talk about things of which we know not.

Right Hon.
