must and will be dictated by Great Britain. She will not abandon her allies for individual advantage, nor accept an equivalent for the ufurpations of her enemies; and the decline of the colonies with the feeds of a negro empire in the West-Indies, will, in spite of the conquests she may retain, render her a loser in that part of the world. She will feek her true and certain indemnity, not in the arbitrary conditions, but in the firmnefs and fecurity of an honourable peace ; and this Power of the third order, will not forget, at a moment when every thing feems attainable to her ambition, that fhe is the mistrefs-nation, not by the extent of her territory and refources, by a predominance of population, or a natural superiority over all Europe together, but by her public and private virtues; her juffice and moderation; her arts and industry; her laws and regulated liberty; her temperate courage; her unaffuming wifdom, and that moral greatness which the opposes to every danger, and to the feductions of victory itfelf.
