J. P. Bickell & Co. say at the close: Wheat—Lower cables and continued dullness in cash circles discouraging holders. Liquidation apparent on all light rallies. As we have repeated so often of late, carrying charges discount possibilities. We continue to advise sales on all bulges. Erickson Perkins & Co. had the following to report: Wheat—There was some enquiry here for cash wheat for milling account, with various sales, and a few scattered orders. It was reported having been worked late yesterday to go to the seaboard. We continued to feel that the long side on weak spots is preferable. Corn—There was some little improvement in the cash demand, and offerings from the country seemed to have dried up. Receipts show a falling off as compared with early in the week and last week. We would be careful about selling corn on weak spots. Prices declined early in sympathy with other grains, but rallied and regained all the early loss, with the greatest strength in the nearby months. The falling off in the movement is most marked, and undoubtedly contributed to the first underdone. We are inclined to look for a steady market.

## SILVER MARKET IMPROVES

Renewal of Buying For China Gives Market Better Tone.

Mocatta & Goldsmith, dealers in gold and silver bullion, London, write: After the spell of six consecutive days with unchanged quotations, referred to in our last circular, the market developed a weaker tone, and more in the absence of buyers than from any forced selling the price gradually sagged, to 24 1/2-26 on the 28th and 30th ult.

There has since been a renewal of buying for China, both in Bombay and London, which, together with the income bear covering, has caused an improvement to 24 1/2-26, which we quote to-day with a steady tendency.

The daily offtake in Bombay has increased to about 100 bars and the stock there has decreased to 15,000 bars, but about 1000 bars are being shipped to India by the P. & O. steamer.

Pixley & Abell say: The improvement is mainly due to China, where exchange is now fully up to the parity of silver, and in addition to small purchases here they have bought 150,000 out of silver now on the way from London to India. These purchases have helped to stabilize the market and the bazaar has bought, although not to any large extent. Stocks in London show a tendency to increase and are estimated at £2,000,000, but about £100,000 is expected to go to India this week.
