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# NO WALL STREET STRIKE TO DEMOCRATIC NOMINEE BRYAN HOLDS WHIP HAND

## Resolution Carried by Sweeping Majority is Vigorous Slap for Morgans, Ryans, Belmonts and "Privileged Class" in General—Assures Choice of Progressive, Says Bryan

BALTIMORE, June 27.—(Can. Press.)—William Jennings Bryan to-night led the Democratic convention into a declaration of progressiveness, unheard of in political history. A resolution introduced by him, which was passed by a two-thirds majority, declared the convention opposed to the nomination of any candidate for president under obligation to J. Pierpont Morgan, Thomas F. Ryan, August Belmont or any "privilege-seeking class." The convention was thrown into a furor by the proposition, which, as originally introduced, called for the withdrawal of Ryan and Belmont, delegates from Virginia and New York respectively. This part of the resolution was reversed as invading the rights of sovereign states, and when its full import became known, "boos and catcalls, jeers and hisses were mingled with hand-clapping, cheers and stamping of feet in the galleries and on the floor. When Virginia and New York refused to ask the withdrawal of Belmont and Ryan, Bryan withdrew himself, and thus closed the session of the gathering and resumed his speech.

## WOMAN CHARGED WITH BIGAMY

Fannie White Long is Alleged to Have Re-married While First Husband Was Alive.

Fannie White Long, who is better known by the name of Fannie White, and whose home is in Drayton, Ont., Lambton County, was arrested yesterday by Detective Murray, on a charge of bigamy. High Constable Green of Drayton preferred the charge. She was rooming at a house on Huron street at the time of her arrest. Mrs. Long said she would not live with Long any more anyway. She had asked him to buy her a pair of new shoes the other day, and he had answered that he had worn his "Sunday" pair for the last six years, and expected to get six years more wear out of them. He refused her plea and consequently she doesn't want to have anything more to do with him. As to the bigamy charge, she repudiated it, and says that Long has told her in confidence more than once that he had been married before.

## SAYS DARROW OF LURED BRIBE

Chicago Detective Alleges Lawyer Sought to Prevent Information Leaking Out to Burns.

LOS ANGELES, June 27.—(Can. Press.)—For the first time a witness in the Darrow trial to-day charged Clarence S. Darrow with having personally offered him a bribe to turn back in his testimony against the McNamara brothers. The witness, Guy Biddinger, a Chicago detective, one of the men who arrested James B. ## A GIFT THAT INCREASED FIVE TIMES OVER

Toronto Man Paid \$7600 Two Years and a Half Ago for Yonge-street Tract for Daughter's Christmas Present—She Sells it for \$38,000.

Two years and a half ago, desiring to give his daughter a present for Christmas, just a little different from the ordinary, C. W. Chadwick, who is the big man in the Colonial Realty and Securities Company, bought three and a half acres on Yonge street, west side, between the old Bell Line and Eglinton-avenue, and on the morning of Christmas, turned over the ownership papers to her. The property cost Mr. Chadwick \$7600. He bought it from Mrs. Pugh, whose family had held it for twenty years with no offers. He heard of it one Saturday evening and had signed up for it the next Monday. Last week Thomas Scandion, an agent of a big land syndicate actively engaged in the city, called on Chadwick and told him that the property must have the property. Mr. Chadwick telegraphed his daughter, who had married and is now Ethel G. King, and lives in Edmonton, and the gift was sold for \$38,000, chiefly cash. Mrs. King will re-invest the money about equally in Toronto and Edmonton. The property, in thirty months, sold for five times its purchase price.

## DIAMOND THIEF MAY BE CAUGHT

Alfred Dickson, Arrested in Buffalo, Had Jewelry and Pawn Tickets in His Possession.

Detective Miller went to Buffalo yesterday afternoon to bring to this city a man who gave his name as Alfred Dickson and his age as 22. The Buffalo police arrested Dickson yesterday on a charge of vagrancy. In his possession were found six pawn tickets, one for a diamond ring, on which he got money in Hamilton, and the other five for various jewelry articles, which he had disposed of in Buffalo. What aroused the Buffalo sleuths' suspicion that he had been connected in thieving activities in Canada was the fact that he had in his possession clippings from Toronto papers relative to the two attempted robberies of the P. W. Ellis Co.'s jewelry store on Yonge-street. As it is remembered, one attempt was made about ten days ago to make a steal from the window display in that store. The thief had evidently been interrupted in his first attempt, as, although there had been a part of the glass cut from the window, nothing had been stolen. The second attempt had been more successful. A tray of low-priced diamond rings was stolen. The thief was not caught. The local detectives think that in the apprehension of the Buffalo man, the one who has been responsible for the Toronto attempts has been caught. He will be brought to Toronto to-day.

## THE DOMINION BANK TO BUILD

The Dominion Bank have decided to build at the corner of King and Yonge streets a new building, which will be a temporary quarters. They will start to build at whichever corner they can first get possession of—at Melinda, or the King-street corner. They may also occupy a nearby building for a part of their business during construction. The new building, when completed, will front all the way down Yonge street from King to Melinda, including the St. Charles Restaurant, and extend back to the Michie property. The plans and specifications are well underway.

# MURDERER GOT NESBITT Had No Knowledge Of Farmers' Bank Dealings

## Former President Testified That He Trusted Travers Implicitly in Everything and Was Ignorant of Details of a Banking Business—Had He Known of Loan From Trusts and Guarantee Company He Would Have Resigned—Explained the Keeley Mine Affair.

Dr. W. Beattie Nesbitt was on the witness stand nearly all of yesterday in the enquiry into the affairs of the defunct Farmers' Bank before Sir William Meredith. The doctor testified with much of his old-time vigor and then, parrying the questions of F. E. Hodgins, K.C., with a humorous smile, or meeting some insinuation with emphatic denial. His counsel, Hartley H. Dewar, K.C., was on hand to look after the doctor's rights, but the latter showed no disposition to shield himself behind any privilege and answered questions with apparent frankness every question put to him. He was asked to call the attention of the commission to an editorial which had appeared in the Toronto Globe on June 21, and which he said was grossly mistaken in the facts that some proceeding in the nature of a contempt of court ought to be instituted. Sir William Meredith made no comment, having upon a previous occasion rebuked The Globe for publishing the evidence.

## POUNCE GRIEFS MEET HERE

Nineteenth Annual Convention of International Association of Chiefs of Police of United States and Canada Will Convene in Toronto—Small Gathering in Brantford.

The great yearly meeting of the big chief-police of the continent is to open at Toronto Tuesday, July 2, and will continue through the end of the day and Friday of that week. This is to be the 19th annual convention of the International Association of Chiefs of Police of the United States and Canada and will be the first of these conventions ever held in Canada. The convention will open at the Hotel Victoria on the morning of July 2, with President Major Sylvester of Washington, D. C., in the chair. The big chief will be the guest of the city council at a luncheon at McCook's at 1:30 and at 3 o'clock will tour the city in motor cars. It is expected that the first of these sessions will be held at 8 o'clock a business session will be held.

## SIX MILLION POUNDS IS PRIZE NOW FOR THREE SONS

HAMILTON, June 27.—By the terms of the agreement for the transfer of the Dominion Power and Transmission Co. stock to Mackenzie & Mann, the latter undertakes to pay over \$6,000,000 to the principals who get for their entire stock. Sir John Gibson, \$776,150; William Southam, \$207,490; John Dickson, ex-M.L.A., \$215,000; Col. J. E. Mould, \$1,250,000; John Dixon, \$350,000; W. C. Hawkins, \$38,700. The Toronto interest, it was learned on good authority to-day, paid 125 for the cumulative shares, 115 for the second preference and 100 for the common stock. Some fault is being found by some of the shareholders over the Toronto people being given 125 for the second preference and 100 for the common stock, as allowing Mackenzie & Mann to pay the bulk of the money out of the earnings of the company in that period.

# TOO MUCH QUOR CONSUMED BY FOREIGNERS

## Witnesses at Murder Inquest Agree That Poles Were Drunk Nearly Every Sunday and Fights Were Frequent—One Man Washed Blood From His Hands.

All the English-speaking witnesses connected with the double murder at the Humber Bay Polish colony on Sunday last were examined by County Crown Attorney Greer last night at the inquest into the death of Mike Grynko. Joe Napoli, held on a charge of murder, was present. Coroner Dr. Carman Kicker hopes to get on with the evidence of the Poles when the inquest is resumed. Dr. Forbes Godfrey, who with Dr. Gordon Bates made the autopsy on the body of the murdered man, was due to a hemorrhage about three inches in depth made by a sharp knife, probably double-edged. He thought the knife used would be long and narrow and it was driven with great force on the other wounds also showed. There was no mark of bullet wounds on the body. Dr. Bates corroborated the evidence of Dr. Godfrey.
