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THE ENEMY'S PLANS UPSET.

Fighting Their Way to Commaise, the British Had a Pretty Serious Engagement.

SIX MEN KILLED AND 82 WOUNDED.

Despatch From Governor Hodgson
Telling of the Severe Journey
Colonel Willcocks, dated Farns, Ashmore.

London, July 9.—The Colonial Office has received a telegram from the Governor of the Colony of Natal, dated Farns, Ashmore, telling of a severe engagement between the British and the Zulu forces. The British had a pretty serious engagement, fighting their way to Commaise. Six men were killed and 82 were wounded. The Zulu forces were defeated, and the British were victorious. The Governor of Natal has ordered a day of mourning for the fallen soldiers.

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
