INDIA AT THE CORONATION.

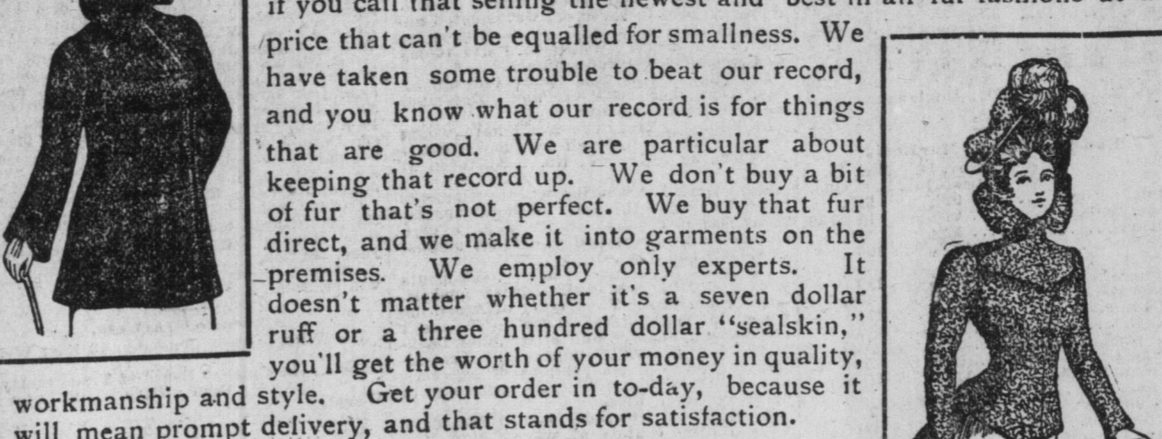
