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ONE CENT

For Peace in the Far East Treaty Important Factor

Anglo-French Arbitration Pact Expected to Be Signed End of Next Week.

London, Oct. 9.—The Anglo-French treaty of arbitration is expected to be signed by Foreign Minister Lansdowne and Ambassador Cambon at the end of next week. Lord Lansdowne is at present away from London.

The Associated Press learns that the treaty will not positively bind the two powers to arbitrate all questions arising, but provides, generally, that, whenever possible, disputes shall be settled in this specific manner, either by their submission to the Hague Arbitration Court or their reference to a special tribunal.

The Associated Press learns that, in addition to the settlement of an Anglo-French arbitration treaty, an important understanding exists between the governments of the two countries in connection with the far East. The foreign ministers of both countries have agreed to exert the utmost possible pressure to prevent their respective embassies in London, Japan, and Berlin, from coming to hostilities. This understanding is the most important factor looking to peace in the far East, and taken in conjunction with the Japanese assurances to Russia, with regard to the evacuation of Manchuria and the general pacific tone adopted by the Japanese government and its representatives abroad, it goes far to explain the feeling of security exhibited in London and several other European capitals in connection with the alarming reports emanating from China and elsewhere.

German View of Preference Phenomenon Confronting

London News Says Laurier's Declaration Damns Mr. Chamberlain's Scheme.

Canadian Cable. London, Oct. 9.—The Frankfurter Zeitung says: "The practical carrying out of Mr. Chamberlain's proposal is a possibility we must seriously reckon with in our international commercial policy or be confronted with a new phenomenon; shall we see the colonies retain their independent fiscal policies and enjoy preferential treatment at the hands of another country and vice versa? While both parties claim from outside states the most favored nation treatment, they decline to grant anything in return, as in the case of Canada, which has shown that this policy does not work."

The Birmingham Daily Mail says concerning the appointment of a Colonial Secretary that after Lord Milner's resignation, the British Government has appointed Mr. Alfred Lyttelton and Sir Edgar Vincent, the latter, the father of retaliatory tariffs, was favored by the highest four, but Chamberlain insisted on Lyttelton.

FOUR STUDENTS CLING TO UPSET CRAFT TWO HOURS

Would Probably Have Perished in Lake But for "Clorita's" Chance Cruise.

Four young men have to thank their lucky stars and the impulse which sent George H. Gooderham cruising in his schooner yacht Clorita. The Clorita got under weigh about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. A strong north wind was blowing at the time. On going thru the western gap they stood off shore. Suddenly one of the professional sailors saw a boat about a mile to windward, and pointed it out to William Fisher, the skipper, who pronounced it a canoe, but the sailor objected that it showed too much hull for such a small craft. The skipper, who decided to go to the cabin and get a pair of field glasses, and upon looking pronounced it to be a boat, and declared he saw a hard waving in the air. The Clorita was put about, but could not make the upset on that tack. Excitement was intense on board, and some of the ladies were much frightened at the thought that they might arrive too late to be of any assistance. The dinghy was towing behind, and on the next tack, was lowered, and two of the nearly exhausted group of four young men pulled in.

STRIKE OF COAL MINERS PREDICTED IN THE WEST

Failure to Adjust Differences Will Precipitate Trouble, Says President Mitchell.

Indianapolis, Oct. 9.—A strike of coal miners in Colorado, New Mexico and Utah will follow failure to adjust differences within a week, according to a statement issued by President Mitchell of the United Mine Workers today.

SLIP IN FARM EXPORTS. Increase From 24 Millions in 1900 to 80 Millions in 1902.

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—(Special)—The final report of the House Committee on Agriculture makes reference to the great increase in exports of Canadian farm and dairy products during recent years. It is pointed out that the export of cheese and butter has risen in value from \$12,700,000 in 1892 to \$25,340,000 last year, and that the total exports of pork and bacon was exported in 1902, as compared with \$600,000 worth in 1900. The total exports of farm and dairy products having increased from \$24,000,000 in 1900 to \$80,000,000 last year.

TURKS CROSS FRONTIER AND ATTACK BLOCKHOUSE

Bulgarian Force, Inferior in Numbers, Retires, Firing on the Invaders.

Kostendil, Bulgaria, Oct. 9.—A battalion of Turkish troops occupying a post at Karamanlika yesterday crossed the Bulgarian frontier and attacked a Bulgarian blockhouse. In consequence of the Turkish superiority in numbers the Bulgarian detachment retired, firing on the invaders.

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BALLANTYNE FOR SENATOR. Western Dairyman's Association Will Urge His Appointment.

Brantford, Oct. 9.—At the directors' meeting of the Western Ontario Dairyman's Association today, a resolution was adopted urging the government to make Thomas Ballantyne a cabinet Minister in charge of the dairymen's interests, after first calling him to the Senate. The following declaration was adopted: "Resolved, That we support Mr. Ballantyne as Senator; James Connolly, Robert Johnston, St. Thomas; T. M. Miller, London; Harold Ellis, Agincourt; W. K. MacLeod, Van Neck; I. W. Steinhoff, Stratford; E. P. MacLaren, M.P., Stratford; John Brodie, Mapleton; Andrew Pattullo, M.P., Woodstock; George Hotely, secretary, Brantford; John McQuaker, Owen Sound, and John H. Scott, Chulien. The annual convention will be held in St. Thomas on Jan. 12, 13 and 14, 1904."

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
