This synopsis of the receipts and disbursements of the year presents several marked signs of advancement, but it also exhibits one sign which, after the most favourable interpretation, cannot be deemed satisfactory.

The first hopeful sign is, that the total receipts of 1886 exceed those of 1885 by the large amount of \$1,256.15, and this is exclusive of the sum of \$1,250.00 paid as the first instalment for the organ. While some of this large increase has, undoubtedly, been contributed to meet the necessary outlay for the improvements undertaken, still it is none the less a sign of the financial ability of the Congregation, and on that account merits commendation.

The second commendable feature is, that from so many of the sources of our revenue there is a very considerable increase in 1886 over the receipts from the corresponding sources in 1885.
