Among the names most prominently mentioned are Bishops Carmichael, Mills and Dumoulin, all well known to Lon-Bishop Dumoulin was ordained deacon

He afterward removed from the Diocese of Huron to Montreal, then to Hamilton, and back to Montreal again, where he was elected Bishop Coadjutor of Montreal. Immediately after the Bishop of Canada has been elected, the Primate of All Canada must be chosen. And, besides the ten bishops already mentioned, all the bishops of Rupert's Land will meet with them, and thus the primate will be elected by the Synod of Canada. The Archbishop of Rupert's Land has the calling of the general meeting, and it is possible that Archbishop Matheson will be the choice. The Rev. Samuel Pritchard Matheson, Archbishop of Rupert's Land, was born in Kildman, Manitoba, in 1852, the descendant on his father's side of one of the Scotch settlers brought to the Red River by Lord Selkirk in 1812.

He was educated at Mr. Pritchard's Academy and St. Paul's parish school, and later entered St. George's College school. He was ordained to the priesthood by Archbishop Machray in 1876. He was created a canon in Winnipeg Cathedral in 1882. His rise was rapid, and it was with the commendation of the church in all Canada that he was appointed to succeed the late Archbishop Machray at his death. Archbishop Matheson, among other honors, has held the office of grand master of the Manitoba Grand Lodge.
