Mr. George Ferguson Says the Cariboo Is a Rich Field for A SECOND SHIPMENT OF-Good Companies - Modern Methods Needed.

Mr. George Ferguson, a veteran miner and ex-member of the British Columbia Legislature, is in the city, and may join the exploration party which will leave shortly for the Klondike under the direction of Mr. John A. Moody, broker. Mr. Ferguson has had 23 years' mining experience in the Cariboo district of British Columbia, lation and efforts to better the condition of the farmers. He also commended the Dominion Government for its nersistence in following up the better in Cariboo. The gold belt is very contensive, and in one there are six or extensive, and in one there are six or eight different grades of gold, from the fine dust to the nuggets. The dust on top was fine, and became coarser according to its depth, until the bed rock was reached. There nuggets were found from one to two ounces in weightsome larger. Every claim in the Cariboo district, he says, was taken up in three years, from 1858 to 1861, but the prospectors lest when the excitement died out. The discoveries were very rich; one stretch of five miles yielded \$30,000,000. The shallow placer mining was entirely neglected, as the prospectors kept rushing hither and thither to some big strike. In 1876-77 miners began to pay some attention to placer mining, but they found that Chinamen had cleaned out the shallow deposits, and it would take machinery to get out the other gold. With modern machinery the fields could be worked profitably. One or two mines would this season yield one-half ton of gold. was an easy field to prospect, and in the next twenty years more money would be taken out than ever before. Hundreds of shafts had been sunk in the Cariboo district, but abandoned on account of the lack of capital and supplies. These could readily be worked by modern methods.
