Charming indeed, is the story of
"True Heart Susie." David W. Grif-

fate. Susie, although she never has
forgotten that she was the hearer of
doctors at the wedding of the man she
loved, protects the erring wife, and it
is only after the latter's death that
William comes to a realization of
Susie's great love and both find hap-
piness.

BANISH LIQUOR NOW
FOR FUTURE WELFARE
OF ALL, SAYS PASTOR

"It pleases me, that both the men
and women of my audience are directly
interested in the subject I am to speak
on, for the women, this year, are to
vote, and their vote may be a vital
factor in deciding the issue of the liquor
question," said Rev. Mr. N. S. Mc-
Kechnie, in the church, speaking on the text, "Am I
my brother's keeper?" in reference to
the referendum on the liquor ques-
tion at next month.

"The Bible understands all moods,
the thoughts, every experience, sin and
mirrors all the characters of the past
ages and present generation. There is
an idea prevailing that intemperance
is an evil, peculiar to the present age.
This is a great mistake. The Bible
has come into this subject thoroughly,
describing every phase, every effect on
the human being, and proves, due
punishment for indulging in this sin—
further degradation and ruin to the in-
dividual and calamity to the nations.

Booze Ancient Problem.
The liquor problem of today was a
problem of the ancients. The difference
in the question of the two ages is that
the traffic of today is immeasurably
greater than that of the olden times,
he explained; then, only the rich could
afford it; the cost of producing
fermented wine was very great; now,
owing to the perfecting of methods of
distilling and brewing, the cost has been
greatly lessened, so that it has been
put within the reach of all. "The evil
has permeated every class. The crowd-
ed state of the great cities has aided in
its spread, so that men, women, boys
and girls are affected, causing crime
and degradation.

"We must estimate what our re-
sponsibility is regarding this question.
It is not the effects that the problem
will have on ourselves alone, that we
must consider; but it is a social ques-
tion, affecting every man, woman,
child, and children unborn in this
country. The Bible in many places
teaches that we are our brother's
keeper. Cain, the murderer, asked that
question, but Cain was held respon-
sible by God for his brother.

Bible Sets Responsibility.
Deuteronomy tells of a law of the
ancients that compelled the building of
parapets around the edge of the flat
roofs of the eastern houses, to pre-
vent the neighbors from falling off. Ex-
pected that law a little and it will be
made to cover the present question. It
recognizes the responsibility of one
person for another. "The New Testa-
ment upholds this law in the passage
"There will always be offense, but was
unto him by whom the offence comes."

"What is our responsibility on this
question? We are held responsible so
that liquor will be banished from our
midst forever, or we can bring the
question before the people, and let them
decide. The great argument against aboli-
shing strong drink is that it is curtailing
personal liberty. Personal liberty is a
great question of today, it may be all
right in some things, but when it in-
fringes on the rights of society, it must
be curtailed. That man should do all
that he wishes is anarchy; it would
make might right. In the indulging in
strong drinks one will visit his sins on
his children and his other dependents.

Ballot Beer Intoxicating.
Light beers and wines mentioned on
the ballots are over twice as strong as
those now sold, and are intoxicating. If
we vote yes on the first and third
question, we bring back the bars. "Yes"
on the second and fourth we will make
ourselves partners in the traffic. Are
we anxious to reduce our taxes a few
cents by giving the Government the
thereby placing a stumbling-block in
our brother's path? Let our answer be
"No."

Remember the stand the Bible takes
on the question, and let us not be re-
sponsible before God in bringing this
traffic back.

FIRED BY LIGHTNING,
GARAGE AND MOTOR
BURN; DAMAGE \$1,000

A frame garage and a Ford coupe
motor car, owned by Robert A. Somers,
at 624 Colborne street, were destroyed
by fire early Sunday morning, when the
garage, believed to have been struck
by lightning, caught fire. A chicken
coop adjoining the garage was also
burned. The total damage is estimated
by the owner at \$1,000. The motor car
was insured.

Before the flames were noticed the
frame building was burning too fiercely
to save the machine inside. Although
lightning was not seen to strike the
building, firemen believe it was the
cause of the fire.



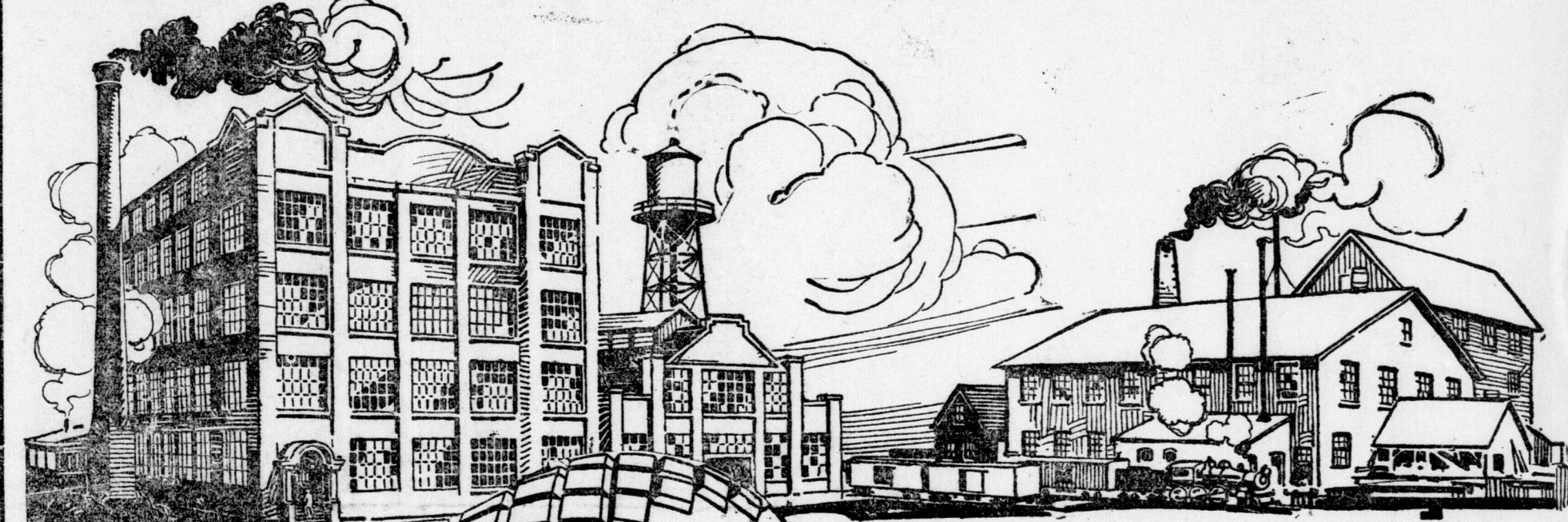
Mary Pickford in "The Hoodlum," the second picture from her own studio, at the Grand for the entire week.
