Sir Robert, in his letter, dated November 1, described this rumor as being utterly "unfounded." Had this been the case, the letter went on to say, the bill would not have been introduced in Parliament.

He did so because the Government realized that the national system of railways is so complete as to jeopardize successful operation. The negotiations had also been entered into because the only other alternative was to allow the Creat Toronto.

For himself, he favored acquisition of the Grand Trunk or any other road which would complete Canada's railway system. If public ownership were found a failure, the government could invite offers for the purchase of its 20,000 miles of roads. Then Canada would have two transportation systems and she had all the machinery.
