

INQUIRY PROMISED INTO CHARGES MADE AGAINST ASYLUM

Inspector Says This Will Be Searching.

There will be a judicial inquiry of the most searching character made by W. W. Dunlop, inspector of prisons and public charities, and the new provincial secretary—whichever he may be—of the charges preferred by Harry Lawder, 359 Halse street, against the Ontario Hospital for Insane.

G. N. Weekes, who is looking after the case for Mr. Lawder, declared today that he was in receipt of a letter from Mr. Dunlop in which he stated that if Mr. Weekes had no objection, he would wait until a new cabinet was formed, and take up the matter with the new provincial secretary under the Drury Government, and that a full investigation would be made. He acknowledged the receipt of the charges made, which covered twelve full type-written sheets.

Twenty-two witnesses will be called in support of the evidence set forth in Lawder's statement. The charges for the most part involve attendants and other employees of the institution, Lawder alleging gross mismanagement and stealing of the most flagrant character, as well as ill-treatment of inmates.

Lawder first made the charges at a meeting of the G. W. V. A. some weeks ago. These charges were absolutely and flatly denied by Dr. W. J. Robinson, medical superintendent at the hospital, who declared that he would welcome an investigation.

ASKS THAT PROVINCE BE GIVEN RIGHT TO PROHIBIT IMPORTATION AND MANUFACTURE OF LIQUOR

W. C. T. U. Mass Meeting Forwards Request To Ottawa—
Opposition Expressed to Another Referendum On Ground of Expense.

At a large mass meeting of those interested in the referendum campaign for prohibition, held last evening in St. Andrew's Hall under the auspices of the W. C. T. U., a resolution was passed asking that the Dominion Parliament be petitioned to give the province of Ontario the right to prohibit the importation and manufacture of liquor within the province, in view of the overwhelming vote in favor of prohibition at the taking of the referendum. Rev. W. E. Prescott, who proposed the resolution, spoke of the great expense which another referendum, such as the Dominion House was now proposing, would entail on the province. The resolution was passed unanimously.

Some Experiences.
The meeting was conducted with Robert Green, chairman of the referendum committee, in the chair, and after a service of prayer and praise, many of those present gave some of their experiences during the referendum campaign, which were most amusing.

After several speakers, including Professor James Bowman, Dr. D. H. Arnold, Mrs. May R. Thornley, Rev. J. McLaughlin, H. Ashpitt, Col. C. M. R. Graham and Wm. Martin, a man arose in his seat and calmly announced that he was probably the only Liberty League member present, and that they were not here to hear from him. Every neck was craned in the direction of the speaker, who, it finally appeared, had merely attended one of the Liberty League meetings "to see what was going on," as he expressed it.

Terrible Results.
"I learned that there were a great many people dying for want of liquor," he declared. "I also learned that the increasing number of divorces in the country were due to the lack of liquor. I heard most strenuous attacks on the preachers and on no one else. Then when the Liberty League procession for Western Ontario moved off from the market square I counted but 81 people."

Rev. W. E. Prescott here arose and corroborated the speaker's count, declaring that there really had been no more than 81 people in the procession. The speaker here had been unable to get support here and that there was no man in London who would lend his name to the project.

Mrs. May R. Thornley referred to the way in which, after voting for 28 years in Canada, she was told she could not vote at the election, because she had never been naturalized, since she married an American husband.

Got Her Vote.
"My naturalization paper came the Friday before the election and I voted," she concluded.

At last night's meeting it was decided to keep the temperance organization for the referendum intact, in case another referendum is necessary, and to importation of liquor into the province.

After the meeting refreshments were served in the hall, and the church to about 500 people. Vocal solos were rendered by Ed. Webster and Mrs. Ed Wyatt.

Presbytery Considers Changing of Fields To Make Possible Payment of Larger Salaries
Largely Attended and Interesting Meeting Held in St. Thomas—Many Congregations Meet Now Rates.

The Presbytery of London met in Knox Church, St. Thomas, on Tuesday, the sessions beginning at 10:30 o'clock. Rev. Dr. D. L. McCune, moderator, presided, and the attendance was very large.

Rev. Dr. Martin of Knox Church, Stratford, was invited to sit and confer with the presbytery on the question of the great foreign mission work of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and the meaning of the forward movement in regard to it.

Rev. T. A. Symington presented a comprehensive report on the question of the salaries of ministers' stipends throughout the bounds of the presbytery, and the minimum of \$1,500 with manse. On the whole a splendid response has come from the congregations both in the rural districts and in the towns and cities, and there are a few dissenting voices. The presbytery will meet again on Friday, the 14th inst. A great amount of business was transacted during the day.

Knollwood Regular Charge.
Knollwood Park was recommended to be made a regular augmented charge of the city, and the matter will be referred to a special committee to consider the question and report to No. 1 committee.

The municipal year book for 1919 is now being prepared by the city clerk, and the second reading of the same will be held in the city hall on Friday, the 14th inst. A great amount of business was transacted during the day.

TO EXTEND LIGHTING ON DUNDAS STREET
Commission Likely To Take Ornamental Lights Further East.

A report on the extension of the city's lighting system will be presented to the public utilities commission Thursday by General Manager E. V. Buchanan. While details will not be available until then, it is understood that an increased lighting system for Dundas street, from Waterloo street to the business section of East London, will be included.

At present the ornamental lights extend only to Waterloo street, from that point the main street is lit only by ordinary lights on the side of the street.

Members of the city council and other public men have urged that the street should be lighted from both sides, as in the downtown district.

AERODROME IN CITY MAY COME SHORTLY
Question Now in Hands of Council Committee.

The establishment of an aerodrome in London will be considered by the committee of the city council.

Mayor Somerville has received a letter from Lieut.-Col. W. Barker, president of the Aero Club of Canada, asking if London is prepared to consider the establishment of a municipal aerodrome to be operated either under the city's direction or to be leased to responsible parties.

Worth Consideration.
"I referred the matter to the committee," said the mayor, "We do not know just how extensive this Aero Club is, but if it is presenting a sound proposition I think we should give it every consideration."

Col. Barker states that one of the objects of the Aero Club of Canada is to develop the interest of aviation generally throughout the Dominion.

The directorate and officers of the Aero Club consist of men who have had considerable practical experience in aviation during the war. Further, the work and policy of the club in the development of aviation is officially recognized by the air board at Ottawa.

AMENDMENT IS COMING
Senator Lynch Staunton Says He Will Move Change to Clause Six.

Ottawa, Nov. 5.—Debate on the second reading of the Grand Trunk bill, which was given the third reading in the Commons at 10:30 this morning, proceeded with in the Senate this morning. As soon as the bill received the second reading, the amendment was moved, and Sir James Loughborough, the government leader, rose to speak in support of the bill.

MILITARY COMMITTEE TO HANDLE VICTORY LOAN

Victory Loan subscriptions from all soldiers and civilian employees of the military districts will now be accepted by a military committee under Major M. Sperry, through arrangements made yesterday. The payments may be desired, be extended over a period of 12 months, upon the following scale:

\$10 Bond—\$5 for first month, \$4 for 10 months, and \$5.50 on two.
\$100 Bond—\$10 for first month, \$8 for 10 months, and \$10.50 on two.

Will Move Amendment.
At this point, Senator Lynch Staunton of Hamilton, interrupted Sir James Loughborough, and proposed an amendment to the bill, to the effect that it would be unwise for the Government to operate the G. T. R. and C. N. R. systems in the west without securing the Grand Trunk lines in Eastern Canada.
